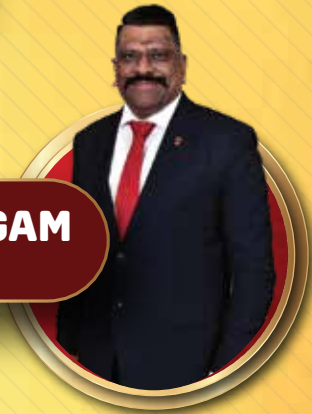

## 2.0 OPENING REMARKS

- 2.1 The Master of Ceremonies, Mr. Thayalavishnu Govindasamy, welcomed the distinguished members and briefed the attendees on the house rules for the 96th Annual General Meeting.
- 2.2 He then invited President Mr. Nivas Ragavan, the President of KLSICCI, to deliver his welcoming speech.

## 3.0 WELCOMING ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT, MR. NIVAS RAGAVAN

- 3.1 President Mr. Nivas Ragavan opened the Annual General Meeting by warmly welcoming all attendees, specifically acknowledging Y.Bhg Mr. Charles Santiago, Co-Chairman of ASEAN Parliamentarians for Human Rights, along with past and current KLSICCI leadership and members. He expressed sincere pleasure at the meeting's "moderate tone" compared to previous gatherings, and particularly thanked Mr. Charles Santiago for his inspiring presence, recognising his distinguished credibility and significant national contributions as a three-term lawmaker.
- 3.2 Reflecting on KLSICCI's impressive 97-year history, President Mr. Nivas Ragavan attributed the Chamber's current robust foundation to the dedicated efforts of its predecessors. He highlighted that the current leadership inherits a strong platform of assets, a large membership, and an established reputation, enabling sustainable service to members. This forward-thinking approach led to the establishment of Vision 2026 in 2022, aiming for KLSICCI to lead in building and transforming a vibrant Indian business community. The core mission under this vision is to guide, diversify, empower, and facilitate the upscale development, modernisation, digitalisation, and networking of Indian businesses across diverse industries.
- 3.3 KLSICCI has made substantial advancements in digital transformation for Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), collaborating closely with the Digital Ministry and MDEC. This initiative equips MSMEs with access to cutting-edge digital tools, including AI, e-invoicing platforms, and improved digital financial services. On the global partnerships front, KLSICCI has forged significant bilateral and trade relationships with Chambers in India and expanded its reach to East Africa, notably signing an MOU with the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry. These efforts aim to boost members' trade opportunities and encourage greater Indian business involvement in the export market, working closely with MATRADE.
- 3.4 Regarding national affiliation, President Mr. Nivas Ragavan reported KLSICCI's strategic partnership, formed three years ago, with the Federation of Malaysian Business Associations (FMBA). As a vice-chairman within FMBA, which represents approximately 200 business organisations and 700 MSMEs, KLSICCI plays a pivotal national role in advocating for industry concerns to the government on policy and budgetary matters, significantly elevating its standing. Additionally, the President announced his recent appointment as the ASEAN-India Business Council Alternate Chair by Minister YB Dato' Sri Tengku Zafrul, further highlighting KLSICCI's increasing regional influence and its commitment to fostering collaborations, particularly with an eye on the upcoming ASEAN Summit.

- 3.5 KLSICCI continues to experience strong internal growth, now boasting over 800 members and planning further expansion, buoyed by increased social media engagement. The Chamber maintains a proactive approach, offering diverse programmes for businesses of all sizes, with a focus on disseminating Budget 2025 information and ensuring members access vital assistance like grants, loans, and capacity-building. He proudly noted growing participation from non-Indian businesses, reflecting KLSICCI's broad recognition and active role in upskilling the community. Looking ahead, KLSICCI is set to celebrate its 97th Anniversary and Business Awards in the first quarter of next year, the first such event in seven years. This significant occasion will involve all members, with Prime Minister Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim confirmed as the Guest of Honour, and the Deputy President unanimously appointed as the Organising Chairman.
- 3.6 The President concluded by expressing deep appreciation to the dedicated EXCOs, Management Council Members, Working Committees, and strategic partners for their unwavering support, affirming their collective commitment to steering KLSICCI towards greater innovation, inclusivity, and prosperity. He also personally acknowledged Mr. Charles for his selfless contributions and highly respected efforts in addressing community issues, expressing hope for his future ministerial role. He emphasised that a chamber of commerce truly is "the beating heart" of a community's economic aspirations.

## 4.0 SPEECH BY GUEST OF HONOUR, MR. CHARLES SANTIAGO

- 4.1 Mr. Charles Santiago commenced his address by expressing his gratitude to the President of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry for the invitation, extending his regards to all executive members and friends of the Chamber.
- 4.2 He immediately delved into a fundamental economic question, drawing on Adam Smith's 1776 work, *The Wealth of Nations*: "Why are some nations rich, and why are some nations poor?" Mr. Santiago underscored the criticality of this question for understanding global business and finance, citing Japan and Singapore as examples of economic success despite limited natural resources. He elaborated on Smith's core insight: successful nations are those organised for profit generation, irrespective of their natural resource endowment.
- 4.3 Conversely, resource-rich nations not geared for profit will struggle. Applying this principle locally, Mr. Charles then questioned whether Malaysia, and crucially, the Indian community, is effectively organised for profit-making.
- 4.4 To support his argument, Mr. Charles presented compelling statistics suggesting the Indian community in Malaysia is currently not optimally organised for profit generation: Indian equity stands at a mere 1.3%, largely concentrated among a few individuals, and a concerning 60% of Indian students drop out at the SPM level, lacking essential future employment skills. These figures, he asserted, highlight a societal structure not conducive to profit generation, posing a significant community challenge.
- 4.5 To enhance the Indian Malaysian community's competitiveness, Mr. Charles outlined three critical areas for immediate action. Firstly, he proposed KLSICCI, potentially collaborating with academia, to establish a research team to identify new business opportunities and future industry trends, such as green technology and digitalisation, and advise members. He highlighted the current underrepresentation of Indians in emerging sectors like solar panels and advanced digital fields such as cybersecurity and artificial intelligence.
- 4.6 Secondly, he urged collective investment in innovation, drawing parallels with other chambers driving internal product and process development. Thirdly, Mr. Charles emphasised the urgent need for a substantial push into digitalisation and the green economy, including green technology and solar panels, areas where other communities are actively engaged.

- 4.7 He concluded by reiterating the urgent imperative for the Indian Malaysian community to strategise and organise itself effectively to foster robust economic growth and enhance competitiveness.

## 5.0 OPENING REMARKS BY PRESIDENT MR. NIVAS RAGAVAN

- 5.1 President Mr. Nivas Ragavan warmly welcomed all past presidents, past Deputy Presidents, Senior Members, and Esteemed Members attending the 96th Annual General Meeting.
- 5.2 He highlighted a crucial agenda item for the AGM: the amendment and clean-up of the Chamber's constitution. The President noted that several constitutional amendments had been received from the floor, expressing his hope for a productive and engaging two-way discussion on these matters. He stated that following the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports, the floor would be open for questions, which would be addressed for the betterment of the Chamber. He encouraged all attendees to raise beneficial points for collective discussion to reach a constructive outcome.
- 5.3 The President then specifically addressed Y.B. Charles Santiago's proposal to form a research centre. He acknowledged the Chinese Chamber's existing Social Economic Research Centre (SERC), which frequently provides questionnaires, and deemed the idea a positive one. He confirmed that this proposal would be thoroughly discussed during the upcoming AGM discussions.
- 5.4 The President concluded his address by thanking the attendees and handed over the proceedings to the Secretary for the introduction of the Secretary's report.

## 6.0 PRESENTATION BY HONORARY SECRETARY-GENERAL, MS. MOGANA CHINNATHAMBY

- 6.1 Following the commencement of the 96th Annual General Meeting, Ms. Mogana Chinnathamby, the Honorary Secretary General, extended a warm welcome to all attendees. As per Clause 15.4 of the constitution, a quorum was successfully established with 76 members present, exceeding the required 36 members. As such, the meeting was called to order.
- 6.2 Ms. Mogana began by conveying KLSICCI's deepest condolences to members and valued family members of leaders and partners who had passed away during the previous year. Their immense contributions were acknowledged, and a moment of silence was observed in their honour. She then requested the members to observe a moment of silence in respect of the following individuals who had passed away:

## **8.0 ADOPTION OF MINUTES OF THE 95TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING**

- 8.1 The Honorary Secretary General reported that the 95th Annual General Meeting minutes, held on 28th April 2024, had been circulated to members via email and WhatsApp, and no amendments were received. Dato' Anusha formally proposed the adoption of these minutes, which was seconded by Mr. Madhu, and the minutes were subsequently adopted without amendment.

## **9.0 PRESENTATION OF ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2024–2025 BY THE HONORARY SECRETARY GENERAL**

- 9.1 Ms. Mogana then presented a comprehensive overview of KLSICCI's achievements for the term April 2024 – March 2025. She highlighted KLSICCI's 96-year legacy, founded in 1928 to champion local Indian businesses, and reinforced the Chamber's commitment to Vision 2026. This strategic vision, established in 2022, aims for KLSICCI to lead in building a dynamic Indian business community by guiding, diversifying, empowering, and facilitating the upscale development, modernisation, digitalisation, and networking of Indian businesses across diverse industries.
- 9.2 The Secretary General outlined her office's crucial administrative and operational role, encompassing governance, communication, event management, and membership development. KLSICCI continues to demonstrate strong internal growth, with 833 registered members as of April 2025.
- 9.3 This figure includes 131 young members and 132 women members, highlighting strong trust and active engagement. Over the past four years, membership has grown by 70%, even after a recent audit conducted as per Clause 7.1.5 of the Constitution, which resulted in the removal of 341 members. Then KLSICCI gives recognition of their long-standing affiliation of over 25 years, Galactic Advance Engg. (M) Sdn Bhd (Mr. Sakthivel) and DSM Konsortium Sdn Bhd (Ms. Logeswary) were formally converted to life members.
- 9.4 In terms of governance, transparency and accountability have been enhanced through the introduction of monthly circulation of Secretarial Reports consists of Management Council Minutes, Monthly Management Accounts and Project Reports to all members.
- 9.5 In Policy Advocacy, KLSICCI has been a strong advocate for Indian businesses, actively engaging various government ministries (including MITI, KUSKOP, Human Resources, Digital, Works, and Health) through its affiliation with the Federation of Malaysian Business Associations (FMBA), where KLSICCI holds a vice-chairmanship. Key issues addressed include foreign worker shortages and access to financing, ensuring that Indian business concerns are incorporated into national policymaking.
- 9.6 For Digitalisation & Economic Development, significant progress has been made in MSME digital transformation. KLSICCI has partnered with the Digital Ministry and MDEC to provide access to cutting-edge tools such as AI and e-invoicing. International collaborations have expanded considerably, with new bilateral ties forged with Chambers in India, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed with the Kenya

National Chamber, and various trade delegations and embassy engagements undertaken. The President's appointment as ASEAN-India Business Council Alternate Chair further highlights KLSICCI's growing regional influence.

- 9.7 From April 2024 to March 2025, KLSICCI held a total of 9 EXCO Meetings and 9 Management Council Meetings as per the table below.

## 10.0 KLSICCI ACTIVITIES FROM APRIL 2024 – MARCH 2025

- 10.1 Under Membership Services & Community Vision, KLSICCI conducted 72 impactful events during the term.
- 10.2 Key programmes supporting members included loan schemes through TEKUN Nasional, disbursing RM 2.5 million to 51 applicants, and the PENN programme with Amanah Ikhtiar Malaysia, disbursing RM 50 million to 2,644 women. A notable success was the PMKS programme with Mitra, which engaged 905 Indian entrepreneurs across all states in business formalisation, financial management, and digitalisation, fostering sustainable economic empowerment.
- 10.3 Further entrepreneurship development was achieved through a recent collaboration with BAC Education, providing training to 30 selected participants. KLSICCI successfully hosted the KLSICCI Fun Run 2025 with 500 participants and the KLSICCI Deepavali Celebration, uniting diverse stakeholders and welcoming prominent Federal Ministers and Selangor State EXCO.

- 11.2 KLSICCI's social media presence has grown significantly, complemented by a revamped, user-friendly website. Moving forward, the Chamber will concentrate on entrepreneurship workshops, digital skills training, and international trade missions. The Secretary General acknowledged the secretariat team's instrumental role in executing the past year's 72 activities, a notable increase from the previous 52.
- 11.3 The report from the Honorary Secretary General was proposed for adoption by Dato' Ramesh Kodammal of Goldtex Exim Sdn Bhd, and seconded by Mr. Charles of Yashree Store Sdn Bhd.
- 11.4 After the Hon. Secretary General completed her presentation, Datin Maheswary Ramasamy of Gayathiri Silk Saaree's Palace Sdn Bhd directed a question to the Honorary Secretary General, Ms. Mogana, concerning allegations made at the last Annual General Meeting regarding the handling of MITRA grants. These allegations appeared to be politically motivated in the context of previous elections. Datin Maheswary inquired whether an official investigation was conducted into these claims and, if so, what the findings were, requesting a formal report on the matter.
- 11.5 Furthermore, acknowledging the Chamber's prior interdicted oath under the MACC (Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission), committing to full transparency and accountability, Datin Maheswary asked if the MACC had ever called in to investigate the mutual accounts. If an investigation by the MACC occurred, she sought to know its outcome and requested that these findings be formally presented at the current meeting.
- 11.6 Ms. Mogana Chinnathamby addressed Datin Maheswary's inquiries by stating that the program has been concluded. She informed the meeting that upon taking office in April, the Council held a meeting in May, and the minutes have been circulated to some members.
- 11.7 Regarding the audit of accounts, Ms. Mogana confirmed that the Chamber has written to the MACC, MITRA, and the Auditor-General Chamber, requesting a direct audit. She clarified that the MACC replied that they referred the matter to the Auditor-General's Chamber, as the MACC itself does not conduct such audits.
- 11.8 Ms. Mogana further explained that the Chamber is currently undergoing an ongoing audit process. They have submitted approximately 450 pages of reports to both the Auditor-General's Chamber and MITRA. At present, MITRA is being audited on this respective program by the Auditor-General's Chamber. The Auditor-General Chamber is expected to conduct a full audit at the Chamber's office once their audit at MITRA is complete; they were initially scheduled to come last month but have not yet finished the MITRA audit.
- 11.9 About this audit, Ms. Mogana mentioned that a few additional documents have been requested. She provided an example where a query was raised regarding six or seven members with Malay names and one Chinese name receiving participants. Upon checking the system, it was confirmed that these individuals are Indian Muslims and "Chindians", making them eligible. Ms. Mogana stated that such queries have come from the Audit Department, and the Chamber is furnishing the requested documents accordingly. She concluded by reiterating that a full audit will take place at their office once the audit concerning their file at MITRA is completed.
- 11.10 Mr. Subramaniam of Clean Q Grip (M) Sdn Bhd presented a proposal focusing on the sustainability and retention of new businesses, particularly those transitioning from home-based operations with MITRA grants. He emphasised the importance of looking beyond initial grants and loans to ensure long-term success for young entrepreneurs.
- 11.11 He proposed the implementation of a mentoring and nurturing program to support these new businesses for one to two years, addressing their sustainability challenges. Mr. Subramaniam highlighted the need for senior business individuals to provide guidance, especially for those starting online or through platforms like TikTok, to help them formalise their operations and establish enterprises.

- 11.12 His key questions revolved around the direction, success rates, and next steps for these businesses after two to three years, moving beyond just providing grants and platforms. He stressed the importance of considering their growth in the immediate, intermediate, and long term. Finally, Mr. Subramaniam expressed his willingness to mentor new businesspeople if given the opportunity.
- 11.13 Ms. Mogana Chinnathamby responded to Mr. Subramaniam's proposal by outlining the Chamber's existing support for new businesses. She stated that they conduct a Pemantauan Programme under the MITRA Scheme for six months. Recognising the need for ongoing assistance, they maintain a broadcast group for participants, ensuring at least ten individuals from each session (totalling 900 per session) attend subsequent training and workshops to foster their development over six months to a year.
- 11.14 Ms. Mogana expressed enthusiasm for Mr. Subramaniam's offer to mentor, highlighting that assistance is needed across all states and that support extends beyond just funding to include access to information and policy development. She concluded by stating that her secretary would contact Mr. Subramaniam to further discuss his involvement.
- 11.15 Dr. Jaya Bushani of Jey's Enterprise initiated her remarks by requesting an update on the Treasurer's status. She then specifically acknowledged and highly commended the Secretary-General, noting that she is currently undertaking the responsibilities of two positions, an unprecedented occurrence in their history. Dr. Jaya Bushani expressed immense pride in the Secretary-General's performance, referring to her as a "superwoman," and conveyed her sincere gratitude for her exceptional contributions.
- 11.16 Mr. Nivas informed the meeting that the Honorary Treasurer was unwell and therefore unable to present his report. As a result, Mr. Tony, the Assistant Secretary, will present the Treasurer's report on his behalf.
- 11.17 The President stated that following the Assistant Secretary's presentation and the subsequent Q&A session, he would officially address a pressing matter highlighted by the auditor, which led to the Auditor's resignation. He clarified that his address would focus on the incidents of the past year and the auditor's feedback, allowing the floor to discuss and work towards a solution.
- 11.18 Ms. Sonia of Surianarayanan Agency raised a question regarding the Annual Report, specifically noting a decline in unit trust investments as presented on page 127. She requested clarification on the reasons for this decline.
- 11.19 In response to Ms. Sonia's question regarding the decline in unit trust investments, President Mr. Nivas Ragavan stated that the query would be addressed after the Treasurer's report had been presented. He clarified that questions at that specific moment were being limited to matters about the Secretary's annual report presentation.
- 11.20 Mr. Lal Singh from Full Protection Sdn Bhd acknowledged the Chamber's extensive efforts in assisting individuals with the MITRA grant. He then raised a point about the commitment of grant recipients, questioning how many of them have subsequently joined the Chamber.
- 11.21 He further stated that while Mr. Subramaniam had commendably volunteered his services for mentoring, the Chamber, as a chamber of commerce, should not solely focus on aiding individuals. He emphasised that recipients must also demonstrate self-help and commitment. Mr. Lal Singh concluded by suggesting the Chamber should consider Mr. Subramaniam's offer.
- 11.22 Mr. Maye Sarera of Anugerah Corporate & Training Services began by commending the President and his team for their efforts. He then posed a question regarding the 13th Malaysia Plan and the national budget. He inquired about KLSICCI's involvement, participation, and input made towards these initiatives.
- 11.23 Specifically, Mr. Maye Sarera asked for clarification on how the Chamber's input is presented to the government. His primary question was whether a special task force

exists to formulate these requests for submission during the national budget dialogue and for the 13th Malaysia Plan.

## **12.0 ADOPTION OF AUDITED STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2024 BY MR. TONY CLIFFORD**

- 12.1 The Honorary Assistant Secretary-General, Mr. Tony Clifford Thomas, presented the Audited Report for the Financial Year 2024, on behalf of Honorary Treasurer Mr. Selvaraj Asiravatham, who was absent due to health reasons.
- 12.2 Mr. Tony directed attendees to pages 104 to 129 of the annual report for the financial statements as of December 31, 2024. He then specifically highlighted pages 105 to 107 for the independent audit report prepared by Syed Mubarak and Co. He quoted the auditor's statement, confirming that there was no material mismanagement to report, thus clearing the audit report.
- 12.3 Next, Mr. Tony moved on to the Statement of Financial Position as of December 31, 2024. He reported non-current assets for 2024 at RM 16,500,562, and current assets at RM 1,354,360. For equity and liabilities, the accumulated fund and reserve stood at RM 17,017,921, with current liabilities at RM 837,001.00.
- 12.4 Subsequently, he presented the Income Statement. The total income for 2024 was RM 638,526, including member subscriptions of RM 383,531.00, rental income of RM 169,400, interest on fixed deposits of RM 6,628.00, dividend received of RM 16,559, MITRA grant allocation of RM 1,214,527, MITRA grant disbursed of RM 1,214,527, and other income of RM 62,408.
- 12.5 Mr. Tony summarised the expenditures, noting a total of RM 789,214. After taxation, there was a net deficit of RM 153,614. He also mentioned investments totalling RM 1,747,812.
- 12.6 Mr. Tony concluded the financial statement report and opened the floor for questions.
- 12.7 Past president Mr. Adolf Ludge began by congratulating the team for their hard work, then expressed his concerns regarding the financial statements, describing them as "worrying."
- 12.8 He also raised an initial point about the reported membership growth, stating that the figures were inaccurate, particularly during his tenure as well as the presidencies of Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan and Mr. Rajaish Kumar Saigal, claiming that the numbers were reported lower. Mr. Adolf emphasised this issue needed to be addressed due to the significant amount of money written off this year, which contributed to a deficit of approximately RM 300,000. He attributed this write-off to a past practice of recruiting members primarily for elections rather than for genuine long-term membership, a practice he insisted must cease to reduce future write-offs and ensure the recruitment of "good members."
- 12.9 Mr. Adolf's second concern focused on the alarming reduction in cash reserves. He noted that the reserves had dramatically decreased from over 5 million ringgits two years ago to slightly over 2 million and currently stood at just over 1 million. He highlighted that if it continued, this trend would lead to the organisation having no money. He urged the Chamber to practice prudent cash management, stressing that it was not solely about profitability. He used the example of the previous discussion about purchasing a building two years prior, stating that with the current cash reserves, such a proposition could not even be considered.
- 12.10 He concluded by briefly mentioning a third issue concerning a separate account for MITRA, asking the Secretary-General if a separate report would be presented or if the matter was closed. He reiterated his concern about the rapidly diminishing cash reserves before concluding his remarks.

- 12.11 Past President Dato' R. Ramanathan of PTC Asia Pacific Sdn Bhd followed Mr. Adolf Ludge's address by offering a broader perspective on the Chamber. He acknowledged the current membership, noting nearly 1,000 total members with over 400 new members in the past year.
- 12.12 He expressed concern about the Chamber building's valuation, believing it is now significantly lower than its previous valuation of RM14 million. He also questioned whether the monthly income of RM14,000 from INSAF Signature's tenancy is sufficient to cover operational expenses, casting doubt on the feasibility of acquiring a new building.
- 12.13 Dato' R. Ramanathan stressed the importance of a strong membership base when engaging with the ministries and government agencies. He argued that the current membership conditions and frequent write-offs are not conducive to growth and hinder the Chamber's ability to attract new members. As one of the oldest chambers in the country, he believes the KLSICCI should aim for at least 1,000 members to enhance its standing and influence when dealing with ministries or other organisations.
- 12.14 He concluded by commending the President for his excellent work. He extended congratulations to Ms. Mogana for her contributions and to Mr. Prabakaran on his appointment as chairperson for the 97th Anniversary. He expressed optimism that the Chamber is moving in the right direction.
- 12.15 President Mr. Nivas addressed Mr. Adolf Ludge's earlier query by clarifying the financial situation. He informed the floor that the Chamber received RM4.7 million from MITRA in 2022, which was carried forward into 2023. Mr. Nivas confirmed that these funds have since been utilised as per the guidelines from MITRA.
- 12.16 He directed Mr. Adolf Ludge to MITRA's full report, specifically page 90, where it is detailed that RM3.99 million has been utilised. The President explained that the significant decrease in cash in hand is a direct result of the outgoing payments incurred over the past two years, which accounts for the reduction in cash flow.
- 12.17 Mr. Adolf Ludge reiterated his earlier point, asserting that MITRA funds should be presented separately and explicitly not included within the Chamber's Profit and Loss statement or balance sheet. This clarification was made to firmly establish his position on the matter.
- 12.18 President Mr. Nivas acknowledged Mr. Adolf Ludge's point and confirmed that, upon completion of the project, pages 89 and 90 detailing the incurred costs had been fully published for review.
- 12.19 President Mr. Nivas responded to Dato' R. Ramanathan's query and suggestion, explaining that while the Chamber previously had 1,200 members as per Dato' R. Ramanathan's request, a constitutional amendment necessitated the write-off of some members. This action was essential to avoid breaching the constitution that was approved last year.
- 12.20 He confirmed that this clean-up process has been completed. Looking ahead, the President highlighted positive membership growth, with approximately 85 new members acquired in the first quarter of the current year. He expressed confidence that membership numbers will significantly increase over the next three quarters and into the following year, attributing this to the Chamber's presence on social media, increased engagement activities, and various projects.
- 12.21 Furthermore, Mr. Nivas made detailed efforts to transition PMKS MITRA participants into full members, echoing a point raised by Mr. Lal Singh. He explained that the Chamber aims to facilitate, engage, and guide these participants, encouraging them to join as members. He believes that the previous challenges faced by potential members (referencing "350 plus 100 is 450") have been addressed, and a one-year facilitation period has concluded. The focus will now shift to closing these memberships.

- 12.22 The President concluded by assuring that the next Annual General Meeting will reflect a significant increase in membership, with numbers surpassing 1,000, aligning with Dato' Ramanathan's advice.
- 12.23 Mr. Tony further supplemented Mr. Adolf Ludge's question by stating that RM1.3 million was allocated from the Chamber's funds for principal investment.
- 12.24 Datuk Tamil Selvan Subramaniam of ATC Academy Sdn Bhd expressed gratitude regarding the accumulated funds and reserves, noting that these funds, which he had previously identified as classified wrongly from the accounts last year, have now been reinstated. Specifically, he acknowledged the correct classification of the building fund and the entrepreneur development fund. He emphasised his satisfaction that the funds for the building and entrepreneur development are now clearly accounted for.
- 12.25 He then focused on the entrepreneur development fund, observing that it currently stands at RM129,700. He advised and proposed that the RM65,000 collected from Basis Bay (RM35,000) and BAC (RM30,000), designated for entrepreneur development, should be properly brought into this fund. He stressed the importance of clearly demonstrating the movement within this account when these funds are expended.
- 12.26 Ms. Mogana clarified to Datuk Tamil Selvan that the funds are not yet reflected in the current account statements because the expenditures only commenced this year.
- 12.27 Datuk Tamil Selvan clarified his point, stating that even if the expenditure occurred this year, the additional RM 65,000 for the entrepreneur development fund should have been reflected in the closing balance of last year's accounts. He stressed that its absence from the current statements raises the same question he posed last year: the whereabouts of these funds within the accounts.
- 12.28 Mr. Tony clarified that the RM65,000 in question is held within the Chamber's current account and is actively being utilised for ongoing programmes.
- 12.29 Ms. Mogana acknowledged that while the RM65,000 is indeed part of the Chamber's general account, she understood the suggestion was to specifically transfer these funds into the entrepreneur development fund. She confirmed that the Chamber would then deduct expenditures directly from this designated fund as they occur. She concluded by stating that this comment would be reviewed further later.
- 12.30 Dr. Maria Rufina of Ace Biznez Academy Sdn Bhd raised a question regarding the Statement of Income and Expenditure on page 110. While commending the extensive activities undertaken by the Chamber, she noted a deficit of RM 153,614, which contrasts with the Chamber's usual focus on achieving a surplus annually. She requested an explanation for this significant deficit.
- 12.31 Mr. Tony confirmed to Dr. Maria Rufina that the RM 150,688 deficit she referenced was indeed the correct figure. He clarified that this deficit is shown after accounting for the write-off of subscription fees, and that it is a non-cash flow item presented per Clause 7.1.5 of their terms.
- 12.32 Ms. Mogana further clarified the deficit for Dr. Maria Rufina, elaborating on Mr. Tony's explanation. She highlighted that the Chamber's income stands at RM 638,526. A significant contributing factor to the deficit is the RM324,459 written off for subscription in aid, which is the largest write-off figure. She explained that if this figure were excluded from the income statement, the Chamber would instead show a surplus of RM 314,067. Ms. Mogana confirmed that this accounting treatment, which includes the write-off, is the reason for the reported deficit.
- 12.33 Mr. Lal Singh raised a query regarding the high cost of computer upkeep. Ms. Mogana clarified that this was due to maintaining five to seven PCs and laptops in the office, noting that expenses were incurred because of system crashes on these older machines. She further highlighted that the cost for computer upkeep in the preceding year, 2023, was considerably lower, at RM3,000.

- 12.34 Mr. Lal Singh proposed that the Chamber explore leasing computers as a strategy to reduce future expenses associated with maintenance and system failures. He praised the Chamber's overall performance and, following his review of the accounts, formally moved for their adoption. Ms. Mogana acknowledged his recommendation, confirming it would be noted.
- 12.35 Mr. Kumaraguru from Maha Asia began by commending the President, EXCOs, and the council members for their commendable work over the past year.
- 12.36 He then raised concerns regarding the absence of both the Hon. Treasurer and the auditor at the meeting. While acknowledging that the auditor's absence was due to an emergency, he suggested that a representative could have been sent.
- 12.37 Directing his question to the Treasurer, Mr. Kumaraguru, despite understanding the complexities of the current financial situation, including write-offs, inquired about the specific actions the Treasurer has taken to generate income for the Chamber. He noted the importance of this question and acknowledged that while the President would typically support the Treasurer, the Treasurer was not present to address the query directly.
- 12.38 President Mr. Nivas addressed the previous discussion about acquiring a new building, referencing a resolution passed at the 2021 Annual General Meeting to acquire a building valued up to RM2 million, which was not subsequently materialised.
- 12.39 He announced plans to raise RM 2 million at next year's 97th anniversary and business awards event. The target is to purchase a new building for RM 1.5 million, with the remaining RM 500,000 to cover event expenses. The process for formulating a corresponding fee is underway, with further discussions scheduled for the next council meeting. He expressed confidence that the Deputy President and the entire Exco and Council will achieve this fundraising goal.
- 12.40 The President also revealed plans to relocate the Chamber from its current Jalan Tuanku Abdul Rahman premises to a more strategically located, business-friendly environment, citing the deteriorating value of the current location. He mentioned that there has been a proposition to sell the current building, liquidate the funds, and diversify into different financial instruments. Any such significant actions would, of course, necessitate an Annual General Meeting.
- 12.41 He reiterated that the immediate focus is on raising the RM2 million fund for next year's anniversary. He acknowledged Mr. Adolf's consistent point about the current cash position, explaining that while the Chamber currently cannot afford to purchase a building by dipping into existing investments or fixed deposits, the responsibility of this term is to actively raise the necessary funds.
- 12.42 Mr. Kumaraguru voiced an objection to the adoption of the accounts, citing the absence of both the Treasurer and the auditor from the meeting. He then sought to ascertain how many attendees concurred with his view.
- 12.43 Mr. Lal Singh addressed the concern regarding the auditor's absence by stating that the accounts had been properly audited. He emphasised that despite the auditor's physical absence, the external auditors remain responsible for their audit report. He further noted that the agenda includes the selection of new external auditors, implying that a change in auditors would not negate the current auditor's responsibility for the submitted report. Consequently, he saw no reason to delay the adoption of the accounts, reiterating his proposal and calling for a seconder.
- 12.44 President Mr. Nivas addressed concerns regarding the auditor's absence, stating that despite not being present, the auditor's report was presented in the last meeting and that the auditor stands by their findings. He confirmed that the report had been audited and presented to the EXCO and council, where it was discussed and found satisfactory, with key action points noted.

- 12.45 The President also highlighted a concern raised by the auditor over the years regarding the interpretation of rental income, expenses, and payable tax. He indicated that this matter will be discussed in the upcoming council meeting to ensure it is addressed seriously. The objective is to prevent the next team from inheriting tax liabilities when the current officeholders transition out. This point will be clarified with the newly appointed auditor.
- 12.46 Finally, President Mr. Nivas asked for a motion to proceed with adopting the report.
- 12.47 Mr. Nagarajan Lechamanan of Freightex Transport Services requested a brief clarification before the adoption of the report. He extended his greetings to the President, team, and members. He stated that he wished to highlight a few points for clarification, rather than ask direct questions. Noting the numerous questions surrounding investments, particularly Mr. Tony's mention of the RM1.35 million investment, Mr. Nagarajan then asked: "Who is accountable for organising this kind of marketing?"
- 12.48 Mr. Tony clarified that the Chamber's principal money market funds are strategically invested across various portfolios, specifically through the CIMB Bank Principal Money Market. He further explained that a dedicated committee, led by Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran and including other EXCO and Council Members, is responsible for overseeing these investments. Mr. Tony further elaborated that the Chamber's investment strategy involves consulting market players for advice, and that after careful consideration of this expert guidance, funds are then strategically placed in the principal money market.
- 12.49 Upon Mr. Tony's clarification, Mr. Nagarajan then inquired about the identity of the agent involved with CIMB Investments.
- 12.50 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran provided a comprehensive update on the Chamber's investment portfolio.
- 12.51 He stated that approximately RM 1 million was initially invested in the principal investment for the year 2023, yielding a 10.67% return. In January 2024, an additional RM 350,000 was injected, resulting in a 9.92% return for that year. The opening balance of RM1.1 million consequently grew to RM1.6 million.
- 12.52 For the current year, 2025, Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran noted an accumulated growth of approximately 3% on the total RM1.35 million investment.
- 12.53 He identified Mr. Thomas Chan, Associate Director for Principal, as the key principal advisor for their investments. Mr. Tomas Chan had previously presented to the EXCO and Council in September, outlining their investment approach.
- 12.54 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran elaborated on the Chamber's investment portfolio strategy, explaining that while it historically allocated 60% to the money market (akin to bonds) and 40% to equity (global growth), the latter being a higher-risk, higher-dividend component, recent geopolitical financial shifts have led to a change. To move away from high-risk, high-return strategies, the Chamber has now divested from equity, with 90% of its holdings in the money market and SUKUK funds, which typically yield between 1% and 4%.
- 12.55 Addressing a common query, he explained why they opt for money market investments over fixed deposits (FDs). While FDs offer a limited percentage (e.g., 3.6%) for short durations (6 months to a year), the current "money market", where 90% of their funds are held, offers better flexibility and returns. He emphasised that the risk associated with their unit trust or principal investments is minimal.
- 12.56 In conclusion, he reiterated that Thomas Chan, the Associate Director for Principal, is their key advisor. Mr. Rajasekaran also confirmed that Thomas Chan is indeed associated with CIMB.

- 12.57 Mr. Nagarajan directed a question to Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran regarding rumours within the committee. Given the substantial investment of RM 1.3 million, which represents members' funds, he sought clarification to avoid any potential conflict of interest. Specifically, Mr. Nagarajan asked: "Is there any relative involved in this investment?" He expressed a preference for addressing this issue openly to prevent prolonged discussion later.
- 12.58 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran acknowledged Mr. Nagarajan's question, recognising it as a concern also raised by experts. He confirmed that Ms. Lucinda Chan, his mother-in-law, is the key person holding the accounts. Despite this familial connection, he expressed gratitude to her, stating that she had waived all her commission and sales-related fees for this engagement. He clarified that Thomas Chan is responsible for running the advisory board, distinguishing his role from Ms. Lucinda Chan's.
- 12.59 Mr. Nagarajan pressed his concern, directly asking if the situation constitutes a conflict of interest, given that the investment involves members' funds. He emphasised that when managing public money, such conflicts should be avoided.
- 12.60 Dato' Anusha Santhirasthipam of Indus Inova (M) Sdn. Bhd. posed a series of critical legal questions concerning the investment documentation. She specifically asked: "Who signs the documentation?" She sought to clarify whether the signatory was the entity, an individual, or who precisely made the decisions, questioning if it was Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran's mother-in-law, other individuals, or the organisers. Dato' Anusha emphasised the seriousness of these questions, noting that potential allegations of slander and defamation made a clear and careful answer imperative. She reiterated the core legal query: "Is it the entity who signed, Thomas Chan, who signed, or your mother-in-law who signed the document"?
- 12.61 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran clarified that the entity itself signs off on the investment documentation, not an individual. He explained that while Thomas Chan is the associate director overseeing the entire portfolio, he is not the direct account holder.
- 12.62 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran stressed that merely having the account set up does not diminish Thomas Chan's advisory responsibilities. He contended that if achieving a 30% return is deemed a "crime," then he apologises, but maintains it is the best outcome they could achieve. He concluded by asserting that the goal is to act without fear or favour to achieve the necessary objectives.
- 12.63 Dato' Anusha affirmed that legally, there is no conflict of interest if an entity signs off on documentation, as the ultimate responsibility rests with that entity. She cautioned attendees to be mindful that bringing individual names into discussions could border on defamation.
- 12.64 Mr. Lal Singh, citing his significant involvement with investment policy, posed a direct question regarding whether the entity involved possesses an asset management license. He then noted that Principal is part of CIMB, implying that CIMB essentially owns the invested money, which to him suggests the principal investment is guaranteed, though dividends may fluctuate. He concluded by advising all present that a 10% return, when other avenues like EPF offer closer to 6%, is an exceptional yield that warrants no further questioning.
- 12.65 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran addressed the concerns about a conflict of interest, asserting that if this was indeed the primary concern, a broader perspective was needed within the council. He stated that there had been no issue of conflict of interest in other business dealings. He questioned whether obtaining the best market advice and achieving favourable results, particularly in an area where the Chamber lacked expertise, should now be subjected to intense scrutiny. He concluded by noting that this was merely a thought.

- 12.66 Mr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash of Seribu Bio Systems Sdn Bhd expressed appreciation for the positive returns on investment. He clarified that while it is not inherently wrong for someone known to a committee member or a relative to be in charge, acknowledging that no one is criticising the job done, the crucial element is the timing of disclosure.
- 12.67 He stressed that such declarations should be made from day one, not retrospectively. Mr. Chandra emphasised the need for transparency, highlighting similar past issues with the Honorary Treasurer and his acquaintance handling accounts of a vendor, which required intervention.
- 12.68 Mr. Chandra reiterated that transparency is vital in the current era, where all actions should be open. He stated that if there was an oversight in declaring a relationship, it is not a crime, nor is it a sin to apologise for the oversight. He expressed a desire to move forward as a united body at the AGM, affirming satisfaction with the work done, but insisting on the importance of being informed upfront. He concluded by ensuring his comments were not intended to defend or slander anyone.
- 12.69 Dato' R. Ramanathan concurred with the sentiment that Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran should have provided information earlier. While acknowledging and appreciating the profitability of the investments, he stressed that corporate governance is paramount and must be adhered to. He questioned why there was reluctance to address accusations directly, particularly when dealing with serious matters.
- 12.70 Citing an example of a company director's responsibility for tax compliance, he highlighted the importance of avoiding situations that invite doubt. Dato' R. Ramanathan reiterated that while profit is welcome, corporate governance and credibility are far more crucial, especially when managing public funds. He concluded by asserting that transparency is essential and everyone should be fully informed about financial activities.
- 12.71 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran suggested that the Chamber needs to review its constitution bylaws, specifically regarding potential rule breaches. He emphasised the importance of addressing what constitutes a conflict of interest. He proposed that the council agree to develop a clear bylaw defining conflict of interest and to create a corresponding form to properly document all such instances going forward.
- 12.72 Mr. Tony clarified his involvement in the investment from its inception. He explained that Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran initially introduced Thomas Chan to the EXCOs to present the investment idea. The decision to proceed with the investment was not Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran's alone, but rather a collective decision by the EXCO, which was then brought to the council for approval, and the council subsequently agreed. Therefore, Mr. Tony stated he saw no conflict of interest. He reasoned that a conflict would only arise if Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran had made individual decisions or unduly influenced the process by stepping into Thomas Chan's role to directly advise.
- 12.73 President Mr. Nivas addressed the issue of transparency, stating he was not informed about the matter in question, nor were other EXCO members or the council. He reiterated his long-standing advocacy for transparency and accountability from day one, asserting that this information should have been disclosed earlier.
- 12.74 He confirmed that the topic will be discussed at the next council meeting. Moving forward, he pledged to ensure that in any future instances of potential conflict of interest, or if individuals related to council members are involved, all council members will disclose this information in the council meeting. He recalled a similar incident concerning the Treasurer's involvement with vendor RC Machinery, which was disclosed to the council, minuted, and circulated to members, highlighting this as a precedent for transparency.
- 12.75 Mr. Adolf addressed the President and members, advocating for complete openness within the Chamber of Commerce. He urged that, effective immediately, all operations must be transparently monitored. He referenced the consistent emphasis on transparency in presentations, stressing that this principle should apply to all aspects of

the Chamber's dealings, not just selective items. Mr. Adolf asserted that the lack of transparency is an ongoing issue, stating, "It is happening," and called for it to be diligently managed.

- 12.76 Mr. Maye Sarera addressed the Chairman, recalling the earlier discussion regarding the absence of the Honorary Treasurer. He noted that many financial inquiries were being handled by individuals not formally entrusted with the Treasurer's responsibilities, who appeared to be struggling to provide adequate answers due to their lack of direct accountability.
- 12.77 Mr. Maye Sarera addressed the Chairman, recalling the earlier discussion regarding the absence of the Honorary Treasurer. He noted that many financial inquiries were being handled by individuals not formally entrusted with the Treasurer's responsibilities, who appeared to be struggling to provide adequate answers due to their lack of direct accountability. Mr. Maye Sarera contrasted this by stating that the current Treasurer had been highly critical of the previous Treasurer at last year's AGM yet was now notably absent from this year's proceedings. He concluded by stating that the integrity of the Treasurer needs to be examined.
- 12.78 Dato' Ramesh Kodammal seconded the Annual Report for the financial year 2024, which had been previously proposed by Mr. Lal Singh and objected to by Mr. Kumaraguru.
- 12.79 Ms. Sonia again raised three key concerns regarding the Chamber's finances, particularly given the current fund shortage.
- 12.80 Firstly, she highlighted the RM12,600+ expenditure on advertising (page 89 of the budget), suggesting it warrants review. She proposed that, in addition to the Treasurer, someone should be engaged to scrutinise all expenditures.
- 12.81 Secondly, she questioned the RM14,000 spent on computer repairs, stating it is excessive and not ideal, especially when contrasted with the RM3,000 spent in 2023, indicating a significant increase of over RM14,000 to reach RM17,000 in 2024. She suggested that, for future advertising needs, the Chamber should seek quotations from at least three to four agencies to secure the lowest price, emphasising the critical importance of cost-cutting.
- 12.82 Thirdly, Ms. Sonia expressed significant concern over the Unit Trust investment. She noted a substantial drop from RM950,000 in 2023 to RM350,000 in 2024, representing a RM600,000 decrease. She highlighted this as a very concerning decline for the Chamber and questioned why such a significant drop had not received more attention.
- 12.83 President Mr. Nivas clarified that the observed decrease in funds was due to the utilisation and withdrawal of money for money market investments. Addressing the MITRA grant advertisement budget, he explained that the allocation was specifically for advertisements related to open tender processes for equipment disbursement contracts. This necessitated advertising in leading Tamil, English, and Malay newspapers.
- 12.84 Ms. Mogana clarified that the expenditure on computer upkeep was not solely for repairs but primarily for purchasing new systems due to the malfunction of older equipment. She further explained that all Chamber purchases adhere to a stringent process, involving Request for Quotations (RFQs) from at least three vendors, with all procurements being presented to and approved by the Council.

## **13.0 PRESENTATION OF MITRA ACCOUNT FOR THE YEAR 2024–2025 BY MR. TONY CLIFFORD THOMAS**

- 13.1 Mr. Tony Clifford presented the MITRA accounts, outlining the financial position as of January 1, 2024, which began with an opening balance of RM 1,973,691. This balance was specifically allocated, including RM 1,907,194 for participant equipment, RM 26,560 for

marketing (pemasaran), and RM 39,937 for management costs (pengurusan). As of December 31, 2024, key financial movements were reported: RM 1,138,329 was expended on equipment, resulting in a surplus of RM 768,865 for this category. Marketing expenditures amounted to RM 5,500, leaving a remaining balance of RM 21,060. Conversely, management costs saw an expenditure of RM 70,698.00, indicating an overspend of RM 30,761. Overall, total expenditures as of December 31, 2024, were RM 1,214,527, leading to a combined surplus of RM 759,164.

- 13.2 Mr. Adolf Ludge raised a query regarding the potential for recovering the outstanding deficit associated with MITRA.
- 13.3 Ms. Mogana provided an update on the MITRA project funding. She clarified that the allocated funds had been utilised for administrative purposes and staff salaries. An appeal to MITRA for an extension of the project timeline had been approved. However, a subsequent appeal concerning the reallocation of funds is currently awaiting a response. Ms. Mogana also informed the attendees that the staff assisting with the MITRA project concurrently allocate approximately 60% of their time to the project and 40% to general Chamber operations.
- 13.4 Mr. Maye Sarera commended the provision of equipment for the participants and suggested that the names of the recipients could be published. In response, Mr. Tony confirmed the availability of a dedicated website, noting that it features a 'print feed' and hosts all relevant videos and published materials, thereby indicating that such information is already accessible.
- 13.5 Ms. Mogana further elaborated on the public availability of recipient information, directing attendees to page 91 of the annual report. She explained that scanning a QR code on that page would lead to a dedicated website for PMKS MITRA. She confirmed, the website provides comprehensive details for all 905 recipients, including their names, state, and individual photos where provision was granted, serving as verifiable evidence of distribution.

## 14.0 MESSAGE FROM THE KLSICCI AUDITOR

- 14.1 The President initiated a discussion regarding the Honorary Treasurer's position, highlighting concerns previously raised by attendees at recent meetings and through internal discussions. He reminded the floor that, per Constitution Article 16.5, the Honorary Treasurer is solely responsible for all financial and accounting matters, including maintaining proper records, managing income and expenses, preparing budgets, collecting and disbursing monies, and presenting audited accounts for approval. The President informed the meeting that the Treasurer was currently unwell and had been absent from several recent auditor and other crucial meetings over the past two weeks, a situation compounded by existing, repeatedly highlighted concerns regarding the Treasurer's inefficiency and capability in the role, which had been noted in Council discussions.
- 14.2 Crucially, the President reported that the external auditor, Syed Mubarak and Co., a life member who had served the organisation for many years and returned in 2022, had resigned. This resignation was attributed to the Treasurer's absence from the most recent meeting and the auditor's profound disappointment with the discrepancies, inefficiencies, lack of accountability, and the Treasurer's overall conduct during engagement with the audit process, leading him to decline any further liabilities. Given these significant challenges, the President stated that the organisation was experiencing considerable issues because of the situation and sought the floor's guidance on the necessary next steps.
- 14.3 Mr. Lal Singh commented that the organisation's constitution provided for such circumstances and expressed his view that action should have been taken earlier. He found it incomprehensible that the Honorary Auditor had resigned, rather than the Treasurer being removed or resigning, given the situation.

- 14.4 The President emphasised that upon assuming office, all council members and executive committee members are thoroughly briefed on their duties, assigned Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), and provided with a clear scope of work, with their progress addressed in regular meetings. He underscored that office-bearers serve voluntarily and must responsibly fulfil their duties, or step aside if unable to do so, citing his commitment to completing his remaining 11-month term despite significant challenges, rather than resigning or creating difficulties for the Chamber.
- 14.5 He then brought to the attention of the floor the current struggles faced by the executive committee, particularly concerning the accounts, despite consistent reminders to the Treasurer, who is a qualified chartered accountant by profession. The President concluded by seeking guidance from the attendees on how best to address this challenging situation.
- 14.6 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan sought further clarification for the benefit of the members, requesting more specific details regarding the alleged shortcomings of the Treasurer. He particularly enquired about the nature of the issues, beyond a potential disagreement with the auditors, and directly asked whether the accounts had been signed.
- 14.7 In response to Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan's query, Ms. Mogana provided a detailed explanation of the difficulties encountered, particularly over the past two months since March. This period was complicated by the sensitive process of de-registering 341 members per Clause 7.1.5, a task that required input from senior members and legal counsel. This crucial period coincided with the ongoing audit, necessitating the Treasurer's essential engagement. Ms. Mogana revealed that a significant issue arose when the Treasurer communicated directly to the auditor, stating, "I did not read the audit report at all," which caused considerable concern to the auditor.
- 14.8 Subsequently, during a planned meeting involving the auditor, the Treasurer, despite being present, demonstrated a distinct lack of serious engagement and was notably unable to address the auditor's technical finance questions or provide the requisite clarity. Ms. Mogana further detailed instances where two separate subsequent meetings, arranged to rectify these issues, were affected by the Treasurer's last-minute WhatsApp notifications, sent merely 30 minutes beforehand, indicating his inability to attend.
- 14.9 Additionally, two other Executive Committee meetings, where his remote participation was requested on medical grounds, also failed to materialise. This consistent lack of engagement made it exceptionally difficult to progress critical work, ultimately requiring the President to arrange a direct meeting between the Treasurer and the auditor, with the assistance of part-time accounts staff, Ms. Lalitha, to finally collect reports, clarify matters, and complete the audit documentation.
- 14.10 The President further emphasised the critical importance of office-bearers upholding and discharging their duties effectively, particularly for senior and high-ranking council members holding Executive Committee (Exco) positions. He stressed that while guidance and advice can be offered, such roles demand serious commitment and a consistent fulfilment of responsibilities.
- 14.11 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan acknowledged the preceding points but sought clarification on specific matters. He questioned the auditor's involvement in the process of writing off unpaid memberships, asserting that the constitutional rules for this procedure were already clear. He then specifically enquired about the Treasurer's attendance at Exco and Council meetings.
- 14.12 The President clarified that merely attending a meeting was distinct from effectively discharging one's responsibilities, emphasising the critical nature of the Treasurer's position. He stated that his intention was not to replace the Treasurer but to address the members, as he was frequently questioned about the Treasurer's whereabouts and performance. The President explained that beyond reporting the Treasurer's medical issues, he was obligated to inform the members about the auditor's resignation and the reasons cited by the auditor.

- 14.13 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan, noting his friendship with the auditor, sought clarification on the specific reasons for the auditor's reluctance to continue, questioning whether internal disagreements within the Executive Committee or Council might have contributed to the issues. He emphasised his neutrality in the matter and suggested that the concerns should have been addressed at a different, potentially disciplinary, level at an earlier stage.
- 14.14 Vice President Mr. Panir Selvam Chandrasegaran highlighted the Treasurer's recent hospitalisation over the past two to three weeks for a medical concern, including ENT issues, which had been verified. He noted that the Treasurer was expected to be present at the current meeting but had cited personal reasons for his absence.
- 14.15 While acknowledging that the Treasurer had maintained full attendance at all Executive Committee meetings throughout the year, Mr. Panir Selvam emphasised that the crucial auditor meetings had regrettably been missed. He suggested that the discussion should now focus on advising the Treasurer on how to resolve his problems, rather than prolonging the argument on this issue.
- 14.16 Mr. Nagarajan Lechamanan shared his personal experience with the Treasurer's professional company, noting that the current difficulties faced by the Executive Committee were not new to him. He expressed empathy for their struggle, having encountered similar issues with his own company, which led his auditor to threaten withdrawal unless a different chartered accountant was engaged. Mr. Nagarajan conveyed that he understood the instability and challenges the Executive Committee was enduring due to the Treasurer's performance.
- 14.17 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan enquired whether these issues should be referred to the Disciplinary Committee to determine if a personality conflict was at play. The President responded by stating there were no personality issues, emphasising that the current struggles were evident. He clarified that the Treasurer's medical condition had only been a factor for the past two weeks, implying that the ongoing difficulties predated this. The President further suggested that personal challenges should be managed without impacting one's professional responsibilities.
- 14.18 Datuk Tamil Selvan challenged the preceding arguments, acknowledging the Treasurer's full attendance at both Executive Committee and Council meetings. He queried whether the Treasurer signed all cheques (which was affirmed, with approval from other office-bearers) and the audited accounts (also affirmed), concluding that the Treasurer had therefore completed his duties.
- 14.19 Datuk Tamil Selvan further suggested the external auditor should focus on his core responsibilities, noting that the accounts were ultimately produced by the Executive Committee and Council. He then enquired if the Treasurer presented accounts at every Council meeting and if any objections were raised (both affirmed as having no issues), leading him to state that he did not perceive any actual issue. He subsequently advised that if the President and Council genuinely believed there was a case, they should formally refer the Treasurer to the Disciplinary Committee, subject to a majority Council vote, and cautioned against future complaints regarding financial matters if due disciplinary process was not followed.
- 14.20 The President stated the necessity of addressing the current serious matter, recalling Datuk Tamil Selvan's tenure as Honorary Treasurer and the various individuals who had served as Treasurer, including Datin Maheswary, Mr. Kumaraguru, and Mr. S. N. Gopal. He clarified that, based on his experience even before his presidency, he was not implying any negative repercussions against Mr. Selvaraj.
- 14.21 Datuk Tamil Selvan, drawing on his four years' experience as Treasurer, stated that all financial matters are presented before Council meetings. He asserted that the Honorary Treasurer's role is to oversee any issues, and since all monies disbursed from the

Chamber require the signatures of three individuals (including the President and Deputy President), all signatories are equally responsible. He then directly requested the President to specify the reasons.

- 14.22 Datuk Tamil Selvan contended that the specific issues regarding the Treasurer remained unclear. He suggested that the Secretariat, supported by Ms. Lalitha (Accounts staff), and the Executive Committee could adequately manage and verify financial matters, indicating that a lack of time prevented delving into excessive detail. He questioned whether the Treasurer was provided with all requisite financial details or if the Executive Committee was solely making financial decisions. Datuk Tamil Selvan concluded by asserting that if a problem were to arise with the audited accounts, which involved the signatures of three parties, the responsibility would be collective, not individual, and should therefore be borne by all three signatories, the EXCO, and the Council.
- 14.23 Ms. Mogana interjected to clarify the ongoing issue, acknowledging collective responsibility but stressing the specific duties inherent in a voluntary Treasurer's role. She highlighted the unacceptability of signing documents without proper review, noting that the auditor's primary concern stemmed from the Treasurer's communication stating he had not read the audit report and his subsequent inability to provide clarification when requested.
- 14.24 Ms. Mogana emphasised that the issue was not the Treasurer's lack of financial knowledge, as he is from an accounting background and has received full support and information regarding the accounts since assuming office, regularly presenting clear accounts. Instead, the fundamental problem lay in his consistent unresponsiveness to queries and inability to engage. She concluded by stating that they had noted the advice regarding a potential disciplinary board referral and would discuss this with the Council to determine the appropriate course of action.
- 14.25 Mr. Adolf Ludge interjected to close the discussion, asserting that the accounts issue was concluded. He highlighted three points: the Treasurer had signed the accounts, the auditor had signed the accounts, and the accounts had been adopted, thus precluding any reopening of the matter. Furthermore, he agreed with Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan's and Datuk Tamil Selvan's view that this issue should not have been raised during the meeting.
- 14.26 Mr. Adolf Ludge advised that the matter should be referred to the Disciplinary Board for resolution, rather than being discussed at the Annual General Meeting. In response, the President sought the consensus of the sitting Council Members and the floor, who collectively agreed to discuss the issue at the upcoming Council Meeting.

## 15.0 RESOLUTION

- 15.1 CONSTITUTION AMENDMENTS BY MEMBERS
- 15.2 The proposed resolution was presented by President Mr. Nivas on behalf of the Management Council.

### **CESSATION OF MEMBERSHIP 7.0 AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 7.1.5**

#### **ACTUAL CLAUSE:**

#### **ACTUAL CLAUSE :**

Any member who fails to pay the yearly renewal subscription for two (2) consecutive years and has outstanding arrears for more than two (2) years shall be automatically terminated as a member of the chamber as of 31st December of the second year.

#### **PROPOSED CLAUSE:**

#### **PROPOSED CLAUSE :**

Any member who fails to pay the yearly renewal subscription for two (2) consecutive years and has outstanding arrears for more than two (2) years shall be automatically terminated as a member of the chamber as of 31st December of the second year. Such a member may rejoin for a new membership after two (2) years.

*Proposed By,*

**Datuk Tamil Selvan Subramaniam @ T. Selvam (ATC Academy Sdn Bhd)**

- 15.3 The President commenced the session by presenting Clause 7.1.5 for amendment. He informed members that this clause had been amended previously last year and was now being brought forward again by Datuk Tamil Selvan, with an additional proposed sentence. This new amendment would stipulate that following the termination of a company's membership, rejoining the same company would only be permissible after two years. The President further clarified that a provision for this proposed resolution currently does not exist within the Constitution. He then requested Datuk Tamil Selvan to provide clarification on the objective behind these proposed amendments.
- 15.4 Datuk Tamil Selvan elucidated the rationale behind the proposed membership reinstatement policy, stating that its primary objective was to inform individuals whose membership had been terminated of the reasons for their termination, particularly should they wish to rejoin the KLSICCI. He clarified that the proposed two-year waiting period for re-admission was per the chamber's constitution, which stipulates that members failing to pay subscription fees for two years are eligible to rejoin only after a two-year interval. This provision aims to offer a clear route for members whose affiliation ceased due to unpaid subscriptions to regain KLSICCI membership.
- 15.5 Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash suggested increasing the waiting period from two to three years. His concern was that the existing clause could be leveraged to register new memberships solely for electoral advantage. He posited that a three-year waiting period would likely cause rejoining members to miss an election cycle, particularly if they were aligned with a specific group or faction within the chamber. Furthermore, Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash recommended that such re-admitted members be assigned new membership numbers, strictly forbidding the reuse of old numbers to mitigate any potential confusion.
- 15.6 Datuk Tamil Selvan clarified the rationale behind the two-year waiting period, aligning with Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash's recommendation. He explained that if a terminated company rejoins after the proposed two-year waiting period, they still couldn't vote for another year, as the Constitution stipulates that new members can only cast their vote after one year of membership. Therefore, the effective waiting period for electoral participation would total three years, as suggested by Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash.
- 15.7 Dato' Ramesh Kodammal expressed his reservations regarding the current focus, stating that it "doesn't make sense" to primarily discuss rejoining policies without addressing the fundamental reasons why members initially departed. He urged the committee to conduct a post-mortem analysis to understand why over 300 members had left the chamber.
- 15.8 Dato' Ramesh Kodammal also highlighted the importance of investigating factors such as the chamber's contributions, any perceived lack of engagement, or other underlying issues. He emphasised that the core problem was not financial but rather rooted in specific reasons that needed to be rectified, advocating for a correct solution derived from a thorough understanding of these reasons.
- 15.9 Dato' Ramesh Kodammal acknowledged the merits of Datuk Tamil Selvan's suggestion but countered that it did not align with the chamber's core mission. He stressed that KLSICCI, as a "Chamber of commerce" organisation, should prioritise helping and supporting members, rather than imposing penalties.
- 15.10 He argued that implementing an immediate re-entry ban for non-payers would unduly penalise micro-SMEs and other struggling businesses that require support. Dato' Ramesh Kodammal underscored the significant impact a two-year disconnection from the chamber could have on a businessman's networking and growth opportunities. He passionately reminded the committee of the chamber's 97-year history of aiding the Indian business community and urged them not to seek self-advantage or penalise members. He concluded by asserting that the focus should be on understanding and rectifying the underlying reasons for member departures, rather than solely on financial aspects.

- 15.11 The President offered an alternative perspective to Dato' Ramesh Kodammal's statement. He noted that while the constitution might bar a specific company (e.g., "ABC") from rejoining for two years after termination, it does not prevent an individual from rejoining immediately under a different company they own (e.g., "EFG"). He stated that this practice is currently observed, with a list of approximately 300 "written off" members being encouraged to rejoin as members through new entities. The President highlighted that if the proposed constitutional amendment were passed, these members would be prevented from rejoining under their old company names but could still re-register under new entities, as the constitution does not explicitly disallow this, provided the council approves such applications.
- 15.12 During the discussion, Datuk Tamil Selvan raised a point regarding the objective he submitted for the amendment of Clause 7.1.5 in the constitution, claiming it was not presented. Ms. Mogana responded by pointing out and reading the objective he had submitted.
- 15.13 Mr. Maye Sarera proposed an amendment to the existing resolution, explaining that members, as businesspeople, often experience forgetfulness due to their busy schedules. He cited his own experience of inadvertently overlooking his subscription fee payment, which resulted in the termination of his membership. However, the President advised Mr. Maye Sarera that a resolution cannot be amended in this manner.
- 15.14 Mr. Lal Singh suggested amending the proposed clause by Datuk Tamil Selvan to include the phrase "two years or more," a suggestion supported by Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan.
- 15.15 Datin Maheswary proposed that members who have had their membership terminated should be permitted to re-register the following year. She clarified that while re-registered members would be ineligible to participate in the current year's electoral process, their involvement should be permitted in subsequent years. This means they could rejoin the Chamber the following year but would be barred from voting or participating in the election until the following cycle. Datin Maheswary emphasised the Chamber's need for new members and suggested that forgetfulness should not be a penalising factor for existing members.
- 15.16 The President then sought confirmation from Datuk Tamil Selvan regarding Mr. Lal Singh's suggestion. Datuk Tamil Selvan affirmed his agreement, stating, "That should be good."
- 15.17 Following deliberation, the proposed amendment to the clause was agreed upon and approved by vote. The resolution's outcome was 45 members in favour, 2 members who objected, and 3 members who abstained from voting. The revised clause now reads:
- 15.18 *"Any member who fails to pay the yearly renewal subscription for two (2) consecutive years and has outstanding arrears for two (2) years or more shall be automatically terminated as a member of the chamber as of 31st December of the second year. Such a member may rejoin for a new membership after two (2) years".*

## **AMENDMENT CLAUSE 10.0 VACANCIES IN OFFICE AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 10.2**

### **10.2 ACTUAL CLAUSE :**

The President shall not hold office for more than two consecutive terms but shall be eligible for re-election after a lapse of two terms.

### **10.2 PROPOSED CLAUSE :**

The President shall not hold office for more than two consecutive terms in any EXCO, Elected Council and Appointed Council positions, but shall be eligible for re-election after a lapse of two terms.

**Adolf Ludge R. Gilbert Gomez (Past President) Servicom Services Sdn. Bhd.**

## AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 10.2

### 10.2 ACTUAL CLAUSE :

The President shall not hold office for more than two consecutive terms but shall be eligible for re-election after a lapse of two terms.

### 10.2 PROPOSED CLAUSE :

The President shall be eligible to hold office for TWO terms ONLY, either consecutively or non-consecutively.

*Proposed By,*

**Mr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash, Seribu Bio Systems Sdn Bhd.**

- 15.19 The meeting then proceeded to discuss Clause 10.2, for which two separate proposals for amendment had been submitted. One proposal was tabled by the former President, Mr. Adolf Ludge, and the other was proposed by Mr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash of Seribu Bio Systems Sdn Bhd.
- 15.20 Mr. Adolf Ludge claimed that the proposal presented was not the one he had submitted to the Secretariat, stating it was not reflective of his command of English. He further asserted that the sitting president should not hold any office in any capacity within the management council. In response, the President presented the proposal submitted by Mr. Adolf Ludge and reviewed it word-by-word before the attendees, confirming it was indeed the same copy.
- 15.21 Mr. Adolf Ludge proceeded to explain the objective behind his proposed amendment to Clause 10.2. He stated that this amendment aimed to ensure the new president and council could establish a fresh leadership, free from the influence of the former President.
- 15.22 Dr. Maria Rufina expressed concern that the proposed amendment could lead to polarisation if an outgoing president were to be intimidating, thereby hindering the effectiveness of the new term.
- 15.23 Mr. Lal Singh requested a re-reading of the clause, expressing his view that the current wording was unclear. Dato Anusha Santhirastipam then suggested inserting the word "subsequent" before the word "EXCO," a modification which Mr. Lal Singh agreed to.
- 15.24 Dato' R. Ramanathan, the former President of KLSICCI, highlighted that it is not common practice in any association for a former President to subsequently serve merely as a committee member after holding the highest office.
- 15.25 In response to Dato' R. Ramanathan's statement regarding the practice of former presidents serving as committee members, Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan light-heartedly remarked on his extensive experience, noting that he had served as President for five terms, had been elected back after completing two consecutive terms, and had also been an elected council member after his presidency.
- 15.26 In response to Dato' R. Ramanathan's statement regarding the practice of former presidents serving as committee members, Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan light-heartedly remarked on his extensive experience, noting that he had served as President for five terms, had been elected back after completing two consecutive terms, and had also been an elected council member after his presidency.
- 15.27 He further recalled and highlighted that another former President, Mr. Ponnusamy Doraisamy, reportedly faced difficulties in his role due to Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan's perceived dominant presence on the Council as a former President. Dato' Teagarajan concluded by stating, metaphorically, that "two captains in a ship don't work," suggesting a potential conflict of leadership.
- 15.28 The President observed that during the current term, some past leaders are utilising two-thirds of the current council members to instigate them for future presidency or leadership. The President noted that such actions would inevitably hinder the current

office bearers' ability to perform effectively for the betterment of the Chamber or any association and indeed disrupt his leadership. Nevertheless, the President reiterated that a former President's presence on the council should always be welcomed if it genuinely benefits the Chamber.

- 15.29 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan suggested that it would be advisable for former Presidents to be appointed to the Chamber's Advisory Board. However, he noted with regret that, within the Chamber's current context, the Advisory Board is not invited to any meetings.
- 15.30 Further to the discussion on the Advisory Board, Mr. Adolf Ludge formally suggested that former Presidents be appointed to this board. He elaborated that this would allow the Chamber to utilise their invaluable experience and suggestions, enabling them to advise current office bearers whenever assistance is required. Mr. Ludge underscored the importance of everybody working as a team for the betterment of the Chamber.
- 15.31 Mr. Lal Singh, drawing upon his experience with an association comprising 1,600 members, highlighted a constitutional clause from that body: Past Presidents are permitted to hold an EXCO position after their presidential term. He explained that the rationale behind this provision is to ensure proper duty safeguards.
- 15.32 Dr. Jaya Bushani presented a scenario where a past president might have initiated a project but was unable to complete it within their term. She highlighted the Chamber's need for such individuals' input to ensure project continuity. To address this, Dr. Bushani suggested not re-integrating past presidents into the council but rather establishing a separate board specifically for past presidents to advise current office bearers.
- 15.33 Mr. Panir Selvam welcomed Dr. Jaya Bushani's idea but voiced a concern: should former presidents be permitted to participate in the current office bearers' work, projects, or even the council, it could lead to the formation of divided teams within the office bearers. He further suggested that a former president might overshadow the current president and the current team, which he deemed neither good nor professional.
- 15.34 Ms. Mogana added that in the context of the President's position, it is paramount that council members are aligned with the President. She emphasised that within the Chamber, the council serves as the highest decision-making body, and the leadership of the President and all decisions ultimately rest with the council. Ms. Mogana suggested that former Presidents could be brought in as advisors or in an ex-officio capacity to provide counsel, but not into an elected position.
- 15.35 Dato' Anusha emphasised the significance of succession planning and transitions, particularly the need to consider past presidents' wisdom, resources, and expertise. She suggested that by taking former presidents on board and assigning them specific roles, their contributions could provide immense value to the Chamber. Dato' Anusha urged the attendees to consider this matter seriously.
- 15.36 Datuk Tamil Selvan, drawing on his experience as a former Deputy President of the Chamber, affirmed that he was honoured to be appointed as an advisor and gladly accepted the role. He stressed that past presidents will always hold a significant advisory role within the Chamber, regardless of whether they are elected.
- 15.37 The President initiated a discussion on the second proposal presented by Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash.
- 15.38 Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash reported a significant termination of over 300 members, primarily attributed to outstanding subscription fees. He posited that many of these individuals, initially recruited for electoral purposes, allowed their memberships to lapse when their sponsoring leaders ceased remitting payments. Dr. Prakash then sought an update on new registrations, to which Ms. Mogana confirmed the approval of 85 new memberships until the last Council Meeting.

- 15.39 Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash underscored his objective to recruit high-calibre members for the Chamber, affirming his impartiality towards any specific group. He highlighted Mr. Nivas as a prime example of a dedicated member, noting his aspiration for the Presidency, which is well supported by his successful execution of 72 Chamber programmes within a single year. Dr. Chandra further emphasised the critical need to bring in new members to nurture future leadership. He then put forward a suggestion that once a member has served as President, they should not be eligible to contest any subsequent positions. This, he reasoned, would prevent the recycling of leadership and actively promote the emergence of new leaders.
- 15.40 Council Member Mr. Krish Madhavan championed a dynamic leadership approach, suggesting that past presidents' expertise be utilised to benefit broader business associations. He emphasised that the Council and members are the bedrock of presidential leadership. Mr. Madhavan proposed that past presidents should primarily act as external advisors, guide the Chamber while focusing their direct service on larger, more strategic endeavours.
- 15.41 The President requested the floor's counsel regarding a potential conflict arising from proposed amendments to the same clause. He noted that Mr. Adolf and Dr. Chandra L. Ram Prakash had both submitted revisions to the existing provision. The President sought guidance on how to resolve the contradictory stipulations should both amendments be approved.
- 15.42 Dato' Ramesh Kodammal, drawing upon his experience, challenged the proposal to restrict former Presidents from re-contesting positions. He highlighted the potential of current leaders, citing a President in his forties. He also highlighted Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran and Mr. Panir Selvam as young future leaders, all possessing the capability to advance the organisation.
- 15.43 Dato' Ramesh Kodammal contended that members must retain unfettered discretion in electing leaders, opposing restrictions on accomplished past presidents. He asserted that a robust organisation facilitates experienced individuals' contributions across diverse platforms. Questioning the rationale behind such limitations, he suggested an underlying apprehension of competition. Dato' Kodammal posited that effective former presidents should be permitted to continue serving the organisation. He advocated for impartial consideration, highlighting younger members' significant, enduring leadership potential, including Mr. Nivas, Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran, and Mr. Panir Selvam.
- 15.44 Ms. Mogana interjected light-heartedly, asserting her youth. Dato' Ramesh Kodammal then posed a rhetorical question, "Why not have a first lady president?", indicating his strong support for such a prospect and proposing her as a suitable candidate for presidency in future.
- 15.45 Dr. Chandra's proposal was subsequently put to a vote. The motion was decisively rejected, with 1 member in favour, 42 objecting, and 4 abstentions.
- 15.46 Following the discussion, Mr. Adolf's proposed amendment was put to a vote and approved with 37 votes in favour, 8 opposed, and 4 abstentions. The approved clause now states:
- 15.47 ***"The President shall not hold office for more than two consecutive terms in any subsequent EXCO, Elected Council and Appointed Council positions, but shall be eligible for re-election after a lapse of two terms"***.
- 15.48 **CONSTITUTION AMENDMENTS BY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL MEMBERS**
- 15.49 Before presenting the Constitutional Amendments proposal on behalf of the Management Council, Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran stated for the record that he has no relationship with the Constitutional Committee. The members of this committee were identified as Mr. Pasupathi, Mr. Muhendran, and Mr. Lal Singh.

15.50 The Constitutional Amendments proposal, previously presented to the Council, was subsequently endorsed for presentation to the floor today. This decision was primarily due to the bulk of the proposed changes being administrative, addressing inconsistencies and redundant clauses within the existing document.

**CLAUSE 3.0 DEFINITIONS  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 3.8**

**3.8 ACTUAL CLAUSE :**

LADY MEMBER means a person or persons who are members of WEDC (Women Entrepreneurs Development Committee) of the Chamber. .

**3.8 PROPOSED CLAUSE :**

Propose the above clause to be removed

15.51 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran explicated that the proposed amendments entail the excising of a particular clause concerning the WEDC. He elucidated that, given the WEDC functions as an internal committee within the organisation, a discrete clause for its purview is deemed supererogatory. Following this clarification, a vote was called for clause 3.8.

15.52 The outcome for clause 3.8 was 40 members voted in favour, zero against, and three abstentions. Clause 3.8 was then removed from the KLSICCI's Constitution.

**3.10 ACTUAL CLAUSE :**

15.53 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran introduced the next item, which concerned the clause defining "youth member" as individuals who are members of YES. He proposed the removal of this clause, explaining it was redundant. He clarified that the organisation already has a dedicated YES committee, led by Mr. Pravin, thus rendering a specific definition within the constitution unnecessary. When put to a vote, the proposal received 46 votes in favour, with no objections or abstentions.

15.54 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran clarified the amendment regarding the definition of "youth member." This amendment ensures that the clause aligns with this classification under the committee itself, rather than focusing on general membership criteria, which would be addressed separately later.

- 15.55 The proposed amendment was unanimously approved, with 45 votes in favour, no objections, and no abstentions. The revised clause now reads:
- 15.56 Young Indian persons between the ages of 18 and 40 (to be determined as of 1st January each year) shall be eligible for YES. Persons above the age of 40 shall be excluded from the committee of YES.

- 15.57 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran then addressed the definition of "lady member." He explained that the existing clause, which stated "Any Indian lady persons shall be eligible for membership of WEDC and will be referred as a lady member. The minimum age is 18," was being streamlined. The proposed amendment simplifies this to: "Any Indian woman member shall be eligible for WEDC." He noted that this revised wording was straightforward.
- 15.58 The clause was subsequently put to a vote, resulting in 45 votes in favour, with no objections or abstentions. The revised clause 4.5.2 now reads:
- 15.59 Any Indian woman member shall be eligible for WEDC.

**CLAUSE 4.0 ELIGIBILITY OF MEMBERSHIP  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 4.5.3**

**4.5. ACTUAL CLAUSE :**

- 15.60 The next item addressed the "lady youth membership" category within the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran explained that this membership, introduced a decade ago with a subscription fee of RM100, was intended to encourage young female participation. However, he reported that this category currently has zero members, as all individuals who might otherwise qualify are joining as ordinary, enterprise, or associate members. To avoid redundancy, the proposal is to discontinue this specific category and allow these individuals to join under existing membership types. The floor was then invited to propose for or against the removal of this clause.
- 15.61 The proposal to remove the "lady youth membership" clause was subsequently put to a vote, with the outcome being 45 in favour, zero against, and zero abstentions.

**CLAUSE 4.0 ELIGIBILITY OF MEMBERSHIP  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 4.6**

**CLAUSE 4.6 Professional Membership  
ACTUAL CLAUSE:**

#### **4.6 PROPOSED CLAUSE:**

Any Malaysian citizen of Indian origin having attained the age of twenty-one (21) years old:

- i. Who is owner or partner registered as a member of a professional body regulated by legislation in Malaysia and has not struck off the register or suspended from practice for any period of time; or
- ii. Who has excelled in his field of work or expertise, who is deemed of benefit to the chamber and is proposed by the Council.

- 15.62 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran announced the introduction of a Professional Membership category. This new initiative aims to broaden participation within the Chamber of Commerce, specifically targeting individuals from professional bodies such as lawyers, doctors, and engineers. He explained that these professions are typically regulated by their respective professional associations rather than the Companies Commission of Malaysia (SSM). As such, this new membership will allow eligible professionals to join the Chamber by providing certification from their professional body in lieu of the standard SSM certificate.
- 15.63 Mr. Lal Singh addressed the proposed Professional Membership clause. He suggested an amendment to the wording, specifically proposing the removal of "who is an owner or partner," so the clause would simply read: "Who is registered as a member of a professional body regulated by legislation in Malaysia." He sought confirmation that these members would pay regular dues, which was affirmed.
- 15.64 Mr. Lal Singh then raised a separate point concerning invited members, distinguishing them from the general professional membership. He clarified that invited members, by nature of their invitation, would not be subject to an entrance fee, though they would cover other associated costs. He emphasised that invited members are considered privileged, possessing no voting rights, but retaining the right to attend events. He concluded by asserting that these two distinct categories of membership should be delineated, with invited memberships strictly at the committee's discretion, expressing his firm belief that this distinction was essential and agreeable to all.
- 15.65 Dr. Maria Rufina's raised query regarding the eligibility of non-entrepreneurs for Professional Membership. In response to Dr. Maria Rufina, He explained that professionals such as lawyers, doctors, engineers, and architects, while often operating their practices as businesses, are typically governed by their respective professional bodies rather than requiring an SSM Certificate. This regulatory distinction has historically precluded their membership in the organisation.
- 15.66 To address this, and to facilitate their involvement, the proposed Professional Membership category will recognise certification from their professional bodies. Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran highlighted that other Chambers, such as the Chinese Chambers, adopt a similar approach, allowing professionals and individuals who have excelled in their fields to join. He expressed confidence that this new category would be mutually beneficial, noting that professionals running their firms, such as lawyers, can fulfil the subscription requirements.
- 15.67 Dr. Maria Rufina then proposed an amendment to the Professional Membership criteria, suggesting the inclusion of the word "business." She reasoned that it would clarify that eligible professionals are those operating their practices, distinguishing them from, for instance, certified managers employed by other entities who might otherwise appear to qualify for membership under the proposed wording.
- 15.68 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran responded to Dr. Maria Rufina's suggestion regarding the inclusion of "business" in the professional membership criteria. He clarified that the very reason they were introducing this new category was to accommodate individuals from professional bodies, which, by their nature, do not typically fall under the purview of the Companies Commission of Malaysia (SSM). This new category is specifically designed to bypass the SSM registration requirement for these professionals.

- 15.69 Mr. Lal Singh reiterated his understanding that the Professional Membership was exclusively for qualified professionals, specifically citing doctors and lawyers. He emphasised that individuals merely employed within such professional offices, but not themselves registered professionals, should not be eligible. He asserted that this distinction must be "abundantly stated" within the clause.
- 15.70 He then revisited his earlier suggestion to amend the wording by removing "who is an owner or partner," advocating for a simpler phrase: "who is registered as a member of a professional body regulated by legislation in Malaysia." He questioned the necessity of adding further qualifiers, implying that a registered professional would be engaging in their practice, whether independently or as part of a firm. He acknowledged that doctors often run their practices, confirming this aligns with the intent of the professional membership.
- 15.71 Ms. Mogana recalled previous discussions during the town hall regarding the professional membership. She reminded the committee that it was suggested this new category ought to fall under associate membership. Furthermore, she clarified that the inclusion of "owner or partner" in the original proposed wording was specifically intended to ensure that eligible individuals were actively practising and operating a firm or organisation. She emphasised the need for clear direction on how to proceed with these considerations.
- 15.72 Mr. Lal Singh opposed the proposal to classify professional members as associate members. He contended that professionals seeking to join the association should be granted ordinary membership status and thus be subject to the standard ordinary membership fees. He underscored that associate members are typically considered privileged, without the full range of rights and voting entitlements, a distinction he deemed unsuitable for professionals intending to formally affiliate with the organisation.
- 15.73 Ms. Mogana sought clarification on the implications of ordinary membership for individual professionals, such as doctors, given that the existing voting rights criteria necessitate the possession of a company or business. She expressed concern that this discrepancy would render the proposed arrangement unworkable and requested immediate direction on how to reconcile these differing requirements.
- 15.74 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran clarified that there is no contradiction between the existing SSM (Companies Commission of Malaysia) requirements for businesses and the proposed framework for professional bodies. He explained that while SSM mandates a specific structure for companies, the Council's intent for professional memberships is that the professional's name should be directly associated with their business name or practice.
- 15.75 Mr. Lal Singh further elucidated the purpose of the Professional Membership, emphasising that the primary objective is to allow individuals who are principals or hold at least a 50% ownership stake in a professional practice to gain ordinary membership based on their professional registration.
- 15.76 Mr. Maye Sarera sought clarification from Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran regarding the proposed Professional Membership. He presented a hypothetical scenario: if he were a lawyer not operating his firm, would he be eligible for ordinary membership or associate membership within what is fundamentally a business chamber? He posed this question to clarify the scope of the new category.
- 15.77 In response to Mr. Maye Sarera's query, Mr. Lal Singh acknowledged it as a pertinent question. He clarified that to be recognised as a lawyer, one must be officially registered, a process which entails financial cost. He further stated that individuals typically would not identify as lawyers unless they are actively practising, implying that non-practising individuals would not require membership with a professional legal body.

- 15.78 Mr. Adolf expressed concern regarding the implications of allowing individual professionals or members of professional bodies to join without the "owner or partner" stipulation. He posited that doing so could potentially lead to a large influx of individual members who might operate differently from traditional business leaders, thereby risking the dilution of the Chamber's core identity. He therefore advocated for retaining the "owner or partner" clause, believing it to be appropriate for maintaining the essence of the organisation.
- 15.79 Datuk Tamil Selvan endorsed Mr. Adolf's concerns. He highlighted the existence of the Associate Member clause and suggested that professional members could be accommodated under this existing category. He firmly argued against allowing lawyers and doctors to participate in the electoral process, asserting that such inclusion would fundamentally dilute the Chamber's identity and historical focus as a business organisation, effectively transforming it into a different type of entity.
- 15.80 Dato' Anusha, speaking as a professional who joined in 1996, strongly advocated for the inclusion of professionals. She asserted that many professionals, such as engineers, engage in daily consulting as their primary work. Citing her memberships in organisations like the Malaysian German Business Council and the Malaysian Canadian Chamber, she warned that excluding professionals, partners, and similar individuals would be detrimental to the Chamber, especially given its current fragmented state and declining membership. She urged the Chamber to unify rather than acting like "mosquito politicians."
- 15.81 She then pinpointed Item 2 of the proposed clause as a "grey area" and a potential "loophole" that could allow individuals without a clear basis to join. She recommended retaining Item 1, which pertains to registered professionals, owners, and partners, as it is straightforward and pertains to genuinely registered individuals. She explicitly suggested removing "Or and item 2" from the clause, fearing it could be broadly interpreted to permit the entry of unsuitable members in the future.
- 15.82 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran then called for a vote from those in favour of removing Item Two from the proposed Professional Membership clause. He stated that if the majority wished to remove this second line, it would necessitate a vote within the ongoing discussion.
- 15.83 A vote was subsequently held to remove Item Two from proposed clause 4.6. The motion passed with 40 members agreeing to the removal, and 3 members voting to maintain it within the clause.
- 15.84 Ms. Mogana then informed the floor that the clause for professional membership will now be categorised under associate membership, a decision Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran concurred with.
- 15.85 The clause was subsequently put to a vote, with 39 members voting in favour of its adoption.
- 15.86 Mr. Maye Sarera proposed that if a professional entity, such as a law firm, operates as a legitimate business, it should be granted ordinary membership with voting rights, rather than being classified under associate membership. He argued that such a firm functions as a business and should therefore be afforded the full privileges of membership.
- 15.87 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran stated that as the clause had already been passed, the discussion would now move forward. He indicated that a separate town hall meeting would be convened to deliberate on the finer details, as the current discussion pertained to both the wording and core intent of the amendment. He concluded that the justification for the change had therefore been adequately addressed.
- 15.88 Dr. Maria Rufina proposed a vote to determine whether professional membership should be classified as ordinary or associate. However, Ms. Mogana interjected, reminding the floor that they had already voted and agreed to classify professional membership under the associate membership category, a point with which Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran concurred.

- 15.89 The revised clause 4.6 now reads:
- 15.90 Any Malaysian citizen of Indian origin having attained the age of twenty-one (21) years old.
- 15.91 Who is the owner or partner registered as a member of a professional body regulated by legislation in Malaysia and has not struck off the register or suspended from practice for any period of time.

- 15.92 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran then introduced the proposed alterations to the subscription fees, specifically those on firms. He explained that previously, firms were subject to an RM100 receipt fee and an RM350 subscription fee. The current proposal aims to standardise these charges, recognising that sole proprietorships, partnerships, Sdn Bhd entities all possess equal voting rights and are equally eligible for council announcements.
- 15.93 He presented two potential approaches to this standardisation: either a universal reduction to RM350, aligning with the existing Sdn Bhd rate, or an increase to RM500 for all companies holding voting rights. Mr. Rajasekaran elaborated on the financial implications of each option, noting that a reduction would inevitably decrease income, while an increase, though potentially boosting revenue, might encounter some resistance. He concluded by inviting questions and deliberation on this clause, underscoring its straightforward nature.
- 15.94 Ms. Mogana further expounded upon the proposed standardisation of subscription fees. She clarified that currently; enterprise memberships are priced at RM350. The proposal suggests increasing this to RM500, aligning it with the existing Sdn Bhd rate. She reiterated that there is no functional difference between these two categories, as both enterprise members and Sdn Bhd members hold ordinary membership status, possessing full voting rights and all applicable privileges.
- 15.95 She underscored Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran's earlier point: the choice lies between increasing enterprise fees to RM500 or reducing the Sdn Bhd rate to RM350. Ms. Mogana emphasised that reducing the fees would significantly impact the organisation's revenue, highlighting that membership subscriptions are currently the primary source of income.
- 15.96 The proposed clause regarding the increase in subscription fees was put to a vote, with the outcome being 35 members in favour and 4 members objecting to its adoption.

**CLAUSE 6.0 ENTRANCE FEE AND SUBSCRIPTION  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 6.2**

**6.2 ACTUAL CLAUSE :**

Members of YES and WEDC who seek full membership of the Chamber shall again complete the form of application for membership of the Chamber and shall be bound to pay all dues applicable to membership of the Chamber at the time of their application. No waiver of the entrance fee or subscription will be allowed to any member of YES or WEDC who seeks membership of the Chamber unless the Council allows for this in any particular case.

- 15.97 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran introduced the next amendment concerning the removal of specific clauses within the constitution that detailed the definitions or functions of the YES (Young Entrepreneurs Section) and WEDC (Women Entrepreneurs Development Committee). He clarified that this was solely a bookkeeping exercise, aimed at standardising the entire constitutional document.

The motion to remove clause 6.2 from the KLSICCI Constitution was then put to a vote and passed with 36 votes in favour and 2 against.

**CLAUSE 7.0 CESSATION OF MEMBERSHIP  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 7.1.9**

- 15.98 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran presented a further amendment, explaining it as another bookkeeping measure essential for streamlining the entire constitution, particularly considering the changes related to WEDC. He clarified that the provisions of Articles 7.1 and 7.3 would now automatically apply to both the YES (Young Entrepreneurs Section) and WEDC (Women Entrepreneurs Development Committee).

- 15.99 Therefore, this specific clause detailing their application was redundant and proposed for removal. He urged members to cast their votes promptly, emphasising the current opportunity to thoroughly tidy up the constitutional document.

- 15.100 The clause was subsequently put to a vote, with 38 members unanimously agreeing to its removal. No votes were cast against it, and no abstentions were recorded.

- 15.101 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran presented a proposed amendment to a clause, highlighting a change to promote gender neutrality. He explained that the original wording used the pronoun "HE," and the proposed revision replaces it with "THEY." This amendment aims to eliminate any potential confusion and ensure the language within the constitution is inclusive. When the clause was put to a vote, 37 members agreed to the change, with no objections.
- 15.102 The revised clause 8.1 now reads:
- 15.103 If any member in the opinion of the EXCO fails to conform to any of the rules and regulations of the Chamber or is guilty of conduct derogatory to the dignity or injurious to the reputation or interests of the Chamber the EXCO may by notice addressed to such member setting out the matter alleged against such member call upon such member to show cause why they should not be expelled or suspended. Should any such member fail within two (2) weeks from the service of such notice to show good cause, the EXCO shall suspend such member for a period of three (3) months pending deliberation with the Council. The Council shall submit the matter to the Investigation and Disciplinary Committee to consider whether or not such a member should be expelled or suspended from the Chamber.

- 15.104 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran presented another clause amendment focused on achieving gender neutrality. He explained the change from the pronoun "HIS" to "THEY," underscoring the organisation's commitment to inclusivity and unity, moving beyond traditional gender distinctions. He expressed satisfaction in noting the current count of 132 women members, highlighting this as a robust figure.
- 15.105 Following this, Dato' Anusha publicly applauded Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran and the Council for their commendable efforts in promoting gender neutrality.
- 15.106 The clause was subsequently put to a vote, receiving unanimous approval with 43 members voting in favour and no objections.
- 15.107 The revised clause 8.4 now reads:
- 15.108 The member expelled from the Chamber under these rules shall not be considered for readmission as a member for a period of two years from the date of their so ceasing to be a member.

**CLAUSE 9.0 OFFICERS AND COUNCIL  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 9.3**

**9.3 ACTUAL CLAUSE:**

The Council may appoint up to ten (10) Council members from among the Chairpersons of District/City Committees of the Chamber and a representative each from YES and WEDC to participate by invitation at each meeting of the Council of the Chamber. However, they will not have a vote, and their presence at any meeting will not be considered for purposes of determining the quorum requirement for any meeting.

**9.3 PROPOSED CLAUSE:**

The Council may appoint up to twenty (20) members to be the Chairperson of District/Working Committees.

They will be invited to participate by invitation at each meeting of the Council of the Chamber. However, they will not have a vote, and their presence at any meeting will not be considered for purposes of determining the quorum requirement for any meeting.

- 15.109 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran presented a proposal to increase the number of council members. Currently, the council may appoint up to 10 members from the district and city committees. To provide greater representation and involvement for the existing 23 to 24 strong working committee, the proposal seeks to amend the constitution to allow for the appointment of up to 20 council members. This expansion aims to officially integrate the contributions of the working committee within the council's structure.
- 15.110 Datuk Tamil Selvan expressed concerns regarding the proposed amendment to the constitution, specifically highlighting Clause 9.3. He noted that the current constitution allows for 10 members for the District Chairperson, and the existing council already comprises 18 members. With additional members, the total currently stands at 34, which he considers excessive.
- 15.111 Datuk Tamil Selvan claimed against increasing the number to 20, which would bring the total to 44. He emphasised that any subcommittees or working committees do not necessarily need to be enshrined in the constitution, as members can always be invited. However, a constitutional amendment would make it mandatory, obligating future officeholders to adhere to the increased number.
- 15.112 He questioned the necessity of such many members for a state-level body, stating that it is "not a national but only a state Chamber." Datuk Tamil Selvan concluded by stating his opinion that amending Clause 9.3 is unnecessary and suggested maintaining the current number of 10.
- 15.113 In response to Datuk Tamil Selvan's concerns, Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran clarified the rationale behind the proposed increase. He emphasised that working committee members often extend assistance within industries themselves, even if they are not formally appointed or co-opted onto the main body.
- 15.114 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran highlighted that limiting representation to districts (potentially only 10) would overlook the crucial input from various industries. He stated that the justification for increasing the number from 10 to 20 is to ensure the body stands by its commitments and effectively incorporates representation from these industries.
- 15.115 Datuk Tamil Selvan clarified that the existing provision for 10 members already encompasses representation from YES and WEDC. He reiterated his position that there is no necessity to amend the constitution to explicitly state this, implying that the current framework is sufficient and does not require a formal, 'black and white' change.
- 15.116 Ms. Mogana further clarified, stating the proposed amendment reflects the current operational reality where industry representatives (not always council members) contribute, making the effective working committee size around 20. The change aims to align the constitution with current and future operational needs.

- 15.117 Mr. Adolf Ludge suggested the co-option process. He proposed that when co-opting members, the existing six co-opted members could be utilised. His suggestion was to consolidate their fundamental propositions and then facilitate their nomination to a new structure.
- 15.118 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran clarified that the co-opted members do not alter the composition required for council meetings, as these primarily necessitate half of the elected members.
- 15.119 Dr. Maria Rufina shared her perspective, based on her experience with the council, stating that a significant proportion of the current council members (at least 50%) are not actively engaged in similar work as the core group. She observed that many existing council members do not contribute substantially.
- 15.120 Dr. Maria Rufina suggested that for "think tank" purposes and specific needs, industry professionals could be invited on an ad-hoc basis. She highlighted the recurring costs associated with monthly meetings, such as food, badges and blazers, which would increase with more permanent members. Therefore, she advocated for leveraging the expertise of industry professionals as needed, without formally adding them to the council, and allowing the existing council to vote on matters.
- 15.121 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran then initiated the vote on the proposed clause. The outcome was 23 in favour and 14 against.
- 15.122 The revised clause 9.3 now reads as follows:
- 15.123 ***The Council may appoint up to twenty (20) members to be the Chairperson of District/Working Committees.***
- 15.124 ***They will be invited to participate by invitation at each meeting of the Council of the Chamber. However, they will not have a vote, and their presence at any meeting will not be considered for purposes of determining the quorum requirement for any meeting.***

**CLAUSE 13.0 GENERAL MEETINGS  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 13.1**

**CLAUSE IN R.O.S (CLAUSE REMOVED DUE TO TECHNICAL ERROR IN R.O.S)**

13.1 An Annual General Meeting shall ordinarily be held on or before the 30th day of April in every calendar year.

**TO BE ADDED**

13.2 The Council, upon receiving a requisition made in writing from not less than one hundred of the voting members of the Chamber, shall, within thirty (30) days, confirm the date of an Extraordinary General Meeting and send out relevant notice to all members.

13.3 Any requisition made by members for an Extraordinary General Meeting shall express the object for which it is desired and shall be let in registered office of the Chamber. It must be signed by the requisitionists and may consist of several documents in like form, each signed by one or more requisitionists.

- 15.125 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran drew attention to a significant discrepancy between the organisation's internal constitution booklet and the copy held by the Registry of Societies (R.O.S). He explained that the ROS version omits a substantial portion, specifically Clauses 13.2 and 13.3, which includes a key provision stating, "an annual general meeting shall ordinarily be held on or before the 30th of April in a calendar year."
- 15.126 He recounted that when the secretariat raised this with R.O.S., they stated it was not their error and advised the organisation to rectify it at their Annual General Meeting (AGM). Therefore, Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran proposed to the floor that the omitted clauses from their existing constitution be formally re-added, allowing them to inform ROS of their inclusion. He then called for a vote from members in favour of this clause.

A vote was held on the proposal to re-add the omitted clauses (13.2 and 13.3) to the constitution, reflecting the version used internally by the organisation. 42 members voted in favour, with no objections recorded.

- 15.128 Datuk Tamil Selvan provided further clarification regarding the discrepancies identified in the Registry of Societies (R.O.S) version of the constitution. He noted that the original Annual General Meeting (AGM) deadline was the 30th of March, which was later amended to the 30th of April and has been consistently observed since.
- 15.129 He posited that when this change was formally submitted to the R.O.S., it appeared only the specific alteration of the date was communicated, rather than the entirety of the relevant clause (13.1, 13.2, and 13.3). Datuk Tamil Selvan suggested this partial submission might have been an oversight, resulting in the omission of Clauses 13.2 and 13.3 from the R.O.S.'s record. He concluded that this earlier, incomplete submission of the amendment was the probable cause for the missing clauses.
- 15.130 To prevent the recurrence of such issues, Datuk Tamil Selvan advised that all future constitutional amendments submitted to the ROS must include the complete and entire clause affected, not just the specific change.

**CLAUSE 15.0 PROCEEDINGS AT GENERAL MEETING  
AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 15.4**

**15.4 ACTUAL CLAUSE:**

No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting unless a quorum of members is present at the time when the meeting proceeds to business. The quorum for a General Meeting shall be twice the number of the elected Council members.

**15.4 PROPOSED CLAUSE:**

No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting unless a quorum is present at the time when the meeting proceeds to business. The quorum for an Annual General Meeting shall be sixty (60) members.

- 15.131 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran introduced a proposed amendment concerning the quorum for general meetings. He explained that the current quorum stands at 36, which is twice the number of elected council members. During recent town hall meetings, several members expressed the view that higher attendance is necessary to facilitate more effective meetings.
- 15.132 Consequently, a proposal has been put forth to increase the minimum quorum for a general meeting from 36 to 60 members. Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran then called for a vote from members in favour of this proposed amendment.
- 15.133 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan offered a differing perspective on the proposed quorum increase. He argued that a lower quorum offers an advantage by reducing the likelihood of meetings being postponed.
- 15.134 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran provided an update regarding recent amendments by the R.O.S. He stated that ROS rules now permit a single postponement if a quorum is not met. Crucially, he added that should the subsequent meeting also lack a quorum, it may still proceed. Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran concluded that this recent change by ROS indicates their acknowledgement of the quorum challenges faced by numerous associations.
- 15.135 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan further elaborated on his concerns regarding an increased quorum. He stated that if the higher quorum were not met at an Annual General Meeting (AGM) and necessitated a postponement, it would negatively impact the chamber's financial resources, preparation efforts, and overall reputation.
- 15.136 The President clarified the rationale behind increasing the quorum. He stated that the primary reason for raising the quorum was a concern raised by the past President, Mr. Lachman Naraindass. He had highlighted that during a non-election Annual General Meeting (AGM), a critical decision such as selling the chamber building could potentially be made by as few as 36 individuals. To prevent such a significant decision impacting the chamber's assets from being determined by a small number of attendees, the decision was made to increase the quorum to 60.

15.137 The proposal to increase the quorum for general meetings to 60 members was put to a vote. 38 members voted in favour of this clause.

**CLAUSE 17.0 NOMINATION PROCEDURES FOR ELECTIONS**  
**AMENDMENT OF CLAUSE 17.2**

**17.2 ACTUAL CLAUSE:**

A member who is being nominated for a Council member position shall be a Director and Shareholder of at least a limited liability company which has an annual turnover of Ringgit Malaysia Five Hundred Thousand (RM500,000) in any of the last three years of the audited accounts that have been adopted and an issued of a minimum paid up capital of Ringgit Malaysia One Hundred Thousand (RM 100,000).

**17.2 PROPOSED CLAUSE:**

A member who is being nominated for a Council member position shall be a Director and Shareholder Sole Proprietor or Partner of at least a limited liability company or firm which shall have an annual turnover of Ringgit Malaysia Five Hundred Thousand (RM 500,000.00) in any of the last three years of the audited accounts.

15.138 Following the presentation of the amendment for Clause 17.2, Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran explained that the proposed change pertains to the incorporation of a firm as part of the nomination process. He stated that, consistent with the recent increase in subscription levels, it is imperative that individuals serving on the council meet an equivalent standard. The amendment aims to standardise this requirement, ensuring fairness and eliminating any prejudice or bias in the nomination process.

15.139 Dr. Jaya Bushani expressed her strong objection to the proposed wording of Clause 17.2, despite acknowledging the intent to upgrade the quality of council members. She challenged the inclusion of specific financial figures, such as RM25,500 or RM500,000, as a criterion for council eligibility, particularly given that all members are already directors paying an RM500 membership fee.

15.140 Dr. Jaya Bushani reasoned that imposing such financial requirements, or demanding access to personal audited accounts, is discriminatory and demoralising, and could lead to a loss of membership. Instead, she proposed an alternative approach focused on fostering leadership through practical experience.

15.141 She suggested that members, particularly younger individuals, be incorporated into existing subcommittees (such as WEDC and other activity-based groups) to gain experience in areas like finance. This would allow them to "test the waters " and demonstrate their activity, leadership potential, and ability to deliver.

15.142 Dr. Jaya Bushani then stressed that the chamber should select leaders based on performance and contribution within these sub-committees, rather than on financial metrics. She views the chamber as a platform for learning and progression and believes that a focus on monetary criteria undermines this purpose and the organisation's long-standing legacy. She passionately urged the chamber not to lose its direction or allow financial discrimination to persist, emphasising that their role should be to teach members to earn money, not to demand it from them.

15.143 Responding to Dr. Jaya Bushani's concerns, Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan clarified that the clause in question has been in existence for a considerable period. He further explained that the requirement is not for an individual to personally earn RM500,000, but rather for their business to have a turnover of RM500,000.

15.144 Ms. Mogana further clarified that the clause under discussion was already in existence. The current amendment by the council simply involves adding the terms "sole proprietor or partner, or firm" to the existing wording, to standardise the entire clause.

15.145 The proposed amendment to Clause 17.2 was put to a vote. The results were 41 members in favour and 1 member against the amendment.

**CLAUSE 19.0  
TITLE IN R.O.S.**

**CURRENT CLAUSE: CLAUSE IN R.O.S.  
(CLAUSE REMOVED DUE TO TECHNICAL ERROR IN R.O.S)**

NOMINATION OF CHAMBER REPRESENTATIVE TO AF

NOMINATION OF CHAMBER REPRESENTATIVE TO AFFILIATED BODIES AND/OR  
GOVERNMENTAL ORGANISATIONS.

- 15.146 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran identified a typographical error in the constitution's title for Clause 18.2. He stated that the current heading reads "Nomination of Chamber Representative to AF," which is incomplete. The correct and full title should be "Nomination of Chamber Representative to Affiliated Bodies and or Governmental Organisations." The amendment aims to rectify this omission and accurately reflect the clause's scope.
- 15.147 The proposed amendment to correct the title of Clause 18.2 was put to a vote. 43 members voted in favour, with no objections recorded.

**CLAUSE 25.0 AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES**

**NEW SUB-CLAUSE UNDER CLAUSE 25.0**

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Rules it is herein declared that the Quorum shall be sixty (60) Members present and voting at any Meeting to change, alter or amend the Constitution. This shall be determined by the Honorary Secretary General before the item is presented. Furthermore, in accordance with R.O.S guidelines such action shall require a two-third (2/3) majority. Such change, alteration or amendment shall only apply once endorsed by R.O.S.

- 15.148 Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran introduced a newly proposed clause requiring a two-thirds majority for any constitutional alteration or amendment, moving away from a simple majority. He referenced previous AGM discussions on this very point, stating that it's important to align with the practice of laws being passed in the country with a two-thirds majority. This change, he explained, would ensure that any future constitutional amendments within the organisation also require a two-thirds majority.
- 15.149 Prior to the vote, Mr. Maye Sarera sought clarification regarding the newly proposed Clause 25.2, questioning whether the required "two-thirds majority" referred to the floor attendees or the total membership of the chamber. Mr. V.K.K. Rajasekaran responded by stating the clause was clear and specified it referred to the two-thirds majority of the attendees present on the floor, subsequently reading the clause aloud to Mr. Sarera to confirm this.
- 15.150 The proposed new Clause 25.2, requiring a two-thirds majority for any future constitutional alterations or amendments, was put to a vote. 43 members voted in favour, with no objections recorded.

## **16.0 APPOINTMENT OF KLSICCI AUDITORS**

- 16.1 President Mr. Nivas Ragavan announced that a letter had been received from Kumpulan Naga, expressing their intention to serve as the chamber's auditors for the upcoming term. The proposal for Kumpulan Naga's appointment was then put forward, proposed by Dato' Anusha and seconded by Datuk R. Ramanathan. The motion was then opened for approval.

## 17.0 ARISING MATTERS

- 17.1 Dr. Jaya Bushani sought clarification regarding the roles of the appointed trustees for the Chamber. In response, the President explained that the trustees' primary function is to safeguard the Chamber's building and assets. He further elaborated on their roles and responsibilities by reading Clause 28.0 of the Constitution to the floor.
- 17.2 Dr. Jaya Bushani then queried, how long they are appointed to which President explained that every term the appointment of trustees will be conducted.
- 17.3 Mr. Adolf Ludge then asked if the appointment of the current Trustees had been proposed and approved in the last AGM. President said that the appointment of the trustee was conducted in the first council meeting for the term 2024-2026 and it was minuted in the previous minutes.
- 17.4 Ms. Mogana further explained to Mr. Adolf Ludge's question and answered that the motion to appoint the trustees in the council meeting was mooted by Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan and it was minuted and sent to all the members upon completing the first council meeting for the term 2024-2026.
- 17.5 Dr. Jaya Bushani then inquired about the duration of trustee appointments, to which the President clarified that trustees are appointed for each new term.
- 17.6 Mr. Adolf Ludge subsequently asked if the appointment of the current trustees had been proposed and approved at the last Annual General Meeting (AGM). The President confirmed that the trustee appointments were indeed conducted during the first council meeting for the 2024-2026 term, and this was duly minuted in the previous meeting records.
- 17.7 Ms. Mogana further elaborated on Mr. Ludge's query, explaining that the motion to appoint the trustees at the council meeting was put forth by Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan. She reiterated that this was minuted and subsequently circulated to all members following the conclusion of the first council meeting for the 2024-2026 term.
- 17.8 Mr. Adolf Ludge wanted to put forth a proposal regarding the trustees; however, since it is not on the agenda therefore the mentioned it will be discussed in the next AGM.
- 17.9 Mr. Lal Singh advised that the president must address the issue of the quorum. Any meeting requisition but be met. We already increased the quorum from 36 to 60, now if any members did not attend, then the meeting should be continued.
- 17.10 Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan delivered an emotional speech, urging the audience to acknowledge the Chamber's history and its past leaders. He challenged their knowledge by asking if they knew the former president and specifically highlighted Tan Sri Kishu Tirathrai's contributions in 1984. Dato' Teagarajan also recognised Haji R.E. Mohamed Kassim as the founding president of the KLSICCI Chamber and suggested honouring "old timers" like Mr. Ramesh Patel for their service. He strongly advocated for documenting the contributions of all past leaders and educating current members about them, an initiative he offered to be a part of.
- 17.11 President Mr. Nivas acknowledged Dato' V.K.K. Teagarajan's suggestion, expressing his desire to honour past leaders during the upcoming 97th anniversary celebration. He further explained that this commitment was the very reason he had previously insisted on featuring all past presidents, from 1928 to 2022, on the first page of the KLSICCI Annual Report.
- 17.12 The 96th Annual General Meeting was then adjourned at 04.33 pm.

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# 96<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

*(18TH MAY 2025, KUALA LUMPUR)*

The delegates are keen to boost this share through direct B2B engagements. To strengthen these partnerships, KLSICCI members were invited to visit Gaziantep, Turkey's main export hub, this initiative seeks to increase trade engagement and strengthen Turkey-Malaysia commercial ties within ASEAN.

They were joined by international delegates representing Russia, India, and Pakistan, making the summit a truly global platform.

This was followed by a courtesy visit by the High Commissioner of Malaysia to Sri Lanka and the Maldives, H.E. Badli Hisham Adam. The Chamber proposed a 30-day “cooling period” before Deepavali, where local councils would stop issuing new permits for private expos or bazaars, except government-organised events. Both sides agreed on the importance of protecting local businesses, strengthening enforcement, and ensuring a more organised Deepavali bazaar environment.

Members actively participated in a discussion session following the presentation, exchanging views on the implications and benefits of adopting electronic voting, including improved efficiency, transparency, and accuracy in the electoral process.

Eligible participants received over 30 types of essential appliances to support their business operations, including:

- Canopies, tables, and chairs
- Kitchen equipment such as freezers, ovens, and mixers
- Machinery for food preparation and service
- Various other required appliances tailored to their specific business needs

Through this program, qualified entrepreneurs from the B40 group were provided with in-kind support, helping them sustain and expand their enterprises. In addition to material assistance, KLSICCI delivered continuous mentorship, training, and guidance over a period of six months to one year, covering essential areas such as business planning, digitalization, licensing, and regulatory compliance.

Each qualified entrepreneur received support worth up to RM 4,800, tailored to their business needs. Additionally, KLSICCI facilitated ongoing training and mentorship, allowing small traders to benefit not only from the in-kind contributions but also from improved business strategies.

# MITRA PMKS PROGRAM GOVERNANCE & AUDIT OVERSIGHT

The MITRA PMKS Program, conducted by KLSICCI commenced in September 2022 and was successfully completed in June 2025.

In line with KLSICCI's commitment towards transparency, accountability, and good governance, the Management Council during the 2024–2026 Term resolved to formally request an independent audit and review of the MITRA PMKS Grant Program by Jabatan Audit Negara (JAN) and the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC). Accordingly, official submissions were made to both authorities on 1st August 2024 and 13th June 2024, respectively.

Subsequently, in July 2025, Jabatan Audit Negara (JAN) conducted a review and audit of the relevant documentation, financial records, and operational matters relating to the two MITRA PMKS programs administered under KLSICCI.



Following the completion of the program, all required reports, supporting documentation, and final submissions were duly submitted to MITRA on 2nd July 2025 in accordance with the program requirements.

During the audit and review process, JAN sought several clarifications and additional supporting information, primarily relating to participant records and documentation matters. All enquiries and requests for clarification were responded to accordingly through the necessary submissions and explanations provided to both MITRA and Jabatan Audit Negara (JAN).

As part of the overall governance and project administration process, and pursuant to discussions held during the Management Council Meetings, KLSICCI also submitted an appeal letter to MITRA pertaining to the extension of the project timeline and the approval of operational fund allocation.

(13th August 2024 – KLSICCI/MITRA/004) & (14th July 2025 – KLSICCI/MITRA/009)

In furtherance of transparency and good governance practices, the status and progress of the MITRA PMKS Program, including matters relating to audit and compliance, were continuously updated to the Management Council throughout the 2024–2026 Term. These updates were formally presented, discussed, and recorded during all 20 Council Meetings held between May 2024 and May 2026. In addition, updates were also circulated through the Monthly Secretarial Report to all members to ensure continued transparency, accountability, and proper governance oversight throughout the implementation of the program.

KLSICCI remains committed to maintaining proper governance standards, financial accountability, and full cooperation with all relevant authorities and stakeholders in relation to the implementation of the MITRA PMKS Program.

## Joy as looks, locks and lustre will not be taxed

PETALING JAYA: For executive Lina, happiness was indulging in facials every two to three months, and hair treatments as well as waxing, manicure and pedicure. And then, things turned ugly. The beauty procedures would all be subjected to the expanded Sales and Service Tax (SST) from Tuesday, the government said.

Yesterday, though, the Finance Ministry did a U-turn, and Lina of Kuala Lumpur can sleep easy again.

"A lot of us women do facials every two to three months, then hair treatments as well as waxing, manicure and pedicure. "We work hard for our money, and we spend most of it on the family. "Treating ourselves in this way is a form of happiness," she said, adding that the tax relief is welcomed.

Assistant manager Faridah Begun Abdul, from Ampang, was happy about the SST exemption for gold because she is preparing for a wedding.

"The price of gold has already soared with global uncertainties, and if you add SST, the total cost will be higher.

"As such, any exemption is welcomed and it will benefit those who invest in gold," she said.

Dentist Kimberly Tan, from Petaling Jaya, was thankful for the SST exemption on apples and oranges as her two kids love to eat fruit often.

"Fruits are my kids' favourites; they consume a lot of it every week so this is a relief for us. "I hope they can expand the exemption to more fruits and other essentials like baby products and healthcare items since these are necessities for young families," she said.

Following public concern and feedback from industry players, the government has exempted SST expansion for the beauty industry, gold as well as imported apples and oranges.

United Asian Hairdressers Association president Dr Michael Poh said they are elated with the decision to exclude the beauty industry from SST.

"This milestone marks official recognition of the hair and beauty industry as a necessity, not a luxury, a critical turning point in our nation's socio-economic landscape," he said while expressing gratitude to the Finance Ministry.

Styling Unisex Hair Salon owner Mogana Chinnathambiy

hailed the tax exemption as a win for macro and small enterprises, particularly those in the grooming and beauty sector.

"This is not just a SST matter. It's about protecting livelihoods, ensuring accessible grooming for everyone, and keeping Malaysia's service economy thriving.

"A heartfelt thank you to the ministries involved," she said.

On June 16, the Federation of Malaysian Business Associations had held a dialogue with Finance Minister II Datuk Seri Amir Hamzah Azizan to put forward industry concerns over the SST expansion implementation on July 1.

## It's an unkind cut, say hairdressers

### Our services are a necessity and not a luxury, claim industry players

PETALING JAYA: Hairdressing and salon industry players have appealed to the government to reconsider imposing the expanded 8% Sales and Service Tax (SST) on their services, which they deem a necessity and not a luxury.

United Asian Hairdressers Association (UAHA) president Dr Michael Poh said hairdressing remains a basic need and personal hygiene-related service for many, including those seeking to treat scalp problems.

"Taxing hairdressing as though it is a luxury service is not only inappropriate, but also unfairly affects both operators and consumers.

"We kindly urge the government to reconsider and exempt hairdressing services to protect this fragile yet essential industry, and prevent further financial strain on micro-entrepreneurs as well as the people they serve.

"Placing it under the same tax category as other luxury or high-margin services does not reflect the economic realities faced by most in our sector," he told The Star.

Poh said a letter by UAHA and other industry players was sent to Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim and the Finance Ministry on June 12 to express their concern regarding the imposition of the 8% tax.

The stakeholders include the Malaysian Hairdressing Association, Bumiputera Hairdressers Association, Malaysian Indian Hairstylist Empowerment Association, Persatuan Kemahiran Wanita Selangor and Branding Association of Malaysia.

The Federation of Malaysian Business Associations has also come up with a petition form for its stakeholders appealing to Finance Minister II Datuk Seri Amir Hamzah Azizan for the postponement and reconsideration of the SST expansion.

According to the Finance Ministry, effective July 1, an 8% SST will be applied to all hairdressing services, which are deemed non-essential services, for businesses with an annual value exceeding RM500,000.

This includes services provided by salons and hairdressers, but not the sale of hair products.

Poh said that given the current situation for financially-strained businesses operating in malls with high rentals, periodic renovations and overhead costs, their average turnover ranges between RM650,000 and RM700,000, which is barely enough to break even.

"In the long run, those operating in shopping malls will have to close down because they are not friendly to the beauty industry. This is an important thing that must be considered.

"If they (the government) want to tax, then use the Goods and Service Tax (GST) of 3% or 6%, which is easier for us, or reduce (the SST) from 8% to 3% so that we can ensure our survival," he said.

Styling Unisex Hair Salon owner Mogana Chinnathambiy said smaller local barbers or salon owners with revenues below the threshold can continue without SST, but many salons in malls or premium areas typically exceed that limit and have started adjusting prices.

"As a responsible salon operator, we fully support tax transparency and compliance.

"If our revenue meets the threshold, we will implement the SST accordingly and ensure that it is clearly communicated to our customers with no hidden or unexpected charges.

"But the majority of customers may reduce frequency from monthly to every two months to cope with the rising costs, and I believe there will be some initial pushback too from customers," said Mogana, who is also Kuala Lumpur and Selangor Indian Chamber of Commerce and Industry Honorary secretary-general.

She hopes the authorities will continue engaging with industry players to review classifications that affect essential services like haircuts, especially in the interest of affordability for the public.

Malaysian Indian Hair Dressing Salon Owners Association honorary secretary-general Jayakumar Manokaran said they will be meeting with their members to discuss the implementation of the SST.

He acknowledged that the 8% SST will eventually be passed on to consumers.

"But we have to bear in mind that they are already being burdened by a lot of other increases in cost of living.

"So, we have to see whether they can eventually afford it.

"The other matter is that the Indian barbers and salons are mostly frequented by the B40 group," he noted.

As such, he hopes the government will reconsider imposing the SST expansion.

### **1. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY AND GENERAL INFORMATION**

The Chamber is registered under the Societies Act, 1966 and domiciled in Malaysia.

The Chamber is a Trade Association, serving the needs of the Mercantile and Industrial community of Indian origin in Malaysia. The aims and objectives for which the Chamber is established shall be for the promotion, protection and advancement of all interests affecting trade and industry of the Malaysian Indian Community. In furtherance of these objectives the Chamber shall be empowered:-

- 1.5 to mediate in disputes between members of the Chamber with the prior permission of the members concerned;
- 1.6 to arbitrate in disputes arising from commercial transactions between members of the Chamber and/or other parties willing or agreeing to abide by the decision of the Chamber;
- 1.7 to sell, improve, manage and develop, exchange, lease, mortgage, dispose of or otherwise deal with all or any part of the property of the Chamber;

#### (a) Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of the Chamber have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRSs") issued by Malaysian Accounting Standards Board ("MASB"), International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRSs") and the requirements of the Societies Act, 1966 in Malaysia.

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia (RM).

Transitioning to MFRS Framework

The financial statement for the financial year ended 31 December 2025 are the first set of financial statements prepared in accordance with the MFRS, including MFRS 1 - First time Adoption of Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards. Subject to certain transition elections as disclosed in Note 23, the Chambers have consistently applied the same accounting policies in their opening MFRS statements of financial position as at 1 Jan 2025, being the transition date, and throughout all years presented, as if these policies had always been in effect. The impact of the transition to MFRS on Chambers reported financial position, financial performance and cash flows, are disclosed in Note 23.

#### (b) Property, Plant and Equipment and Depreciation

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Chamber and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

After recognition as an asset, an item of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses, except for freehold land and buildings.

Assets stated at valuation

After recognition as an asset, freehold land and buildings are carried at their revalued amount, being their fair value at the date of the revaluation, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses. Revaluations are made with sufficient regularity to ensure that carrying amounts do not differ materially from that which would be determined using fair value at the end of the reporting period.

Depreciation on other property, plant and equipment is calculated so as to write off their cost on a straight line basis over the expected useful lives of the assets concerned.

A revaluation increase arising from a revaluation is recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of property revaluation surplus, except when the increase is recognised in the statement of income and expenditure to the extent that it reverses a revaluation decrease of the same asset previously recognised in statement of income and expenditure. A revaluation decrease arising from a revaluation is recognised in statement of income and expenditure, except when the decrease is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent of any credit balance existing in the property revaluation surplus in respect of that asset. The decrease recognised in other comprehensive income reduces the amount accumulated in equity under the heading of property revaluation surplus.

Except for freehold land and building which are not depreciated, depreciation is provided on a straight-line method so as to write off the depreciable amount of the following assets over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Fully depreciation of property, plant and equipment are retained in the accounts at a nominal value of RM1 until they are no longer in use.

If there is an indication of a significant change in factors affecting the residual value, useful life or asset consumption pattern since the last annual reporting date, the residual values, depreciation method and useful lives of depreciable assets are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively.

The carrying amounts of items of property, plant and equipment are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of items of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amounts of the item, is recognised in statement of income and expenditure. Neither the sale proceeds nor any gain on disposal is classified as revenue.

#### (c) Investment

The Chamber measures all equity investments at fair value. Dividends from such investments continue to be recognised in the statement of income and expenditure when the Chamber receives the dividend payments.

Changes in the fair value of equity investments are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure. Impairment losses (and reversal of impairment losses) on equity investments are not reported separately from other changes in fair value.

At each reporting date, the Chamber assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

When there is an indication that an asset may be impaired but it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the Chamber estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

If the recoverable amount of an asset or a cash-generating unit is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised to reduce the carrying amount to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss for a cash-generating unit is firstly allocated to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the cash-generating unit, and then, to the other non-current assets of the unit pro rata on the basis of the carrying amount of each appropriate asset in the cash-generating unit. Impairment loss is recognised immediately in the statement of income and expenditure, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case it is treated as a revaluation decrease.

The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's or cash-generating unit's fair value less cost to sell, value in use and zero.

An impairment loss recognised in prior periods for an asset or the appropriate assets of a cash-generating unit is reversed when there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the asset's recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, if no impairment loss had been recognised in prior periods. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in the statement of income and expenditure, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount, in which case it is treated as a revaluation increase.

#### (e) Financial Assets

Financial assets are recognised in the statements of financial position when, and only when, the Chamber becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

On initial recognition, financial assets are measured at transaction price, include transaction costs for financial assets not measured at fair value through profit or loss, unless the arrangement constitutes, in effect, a financing transaction for the counterparty to the arrangement.

After initial recognition, financial assets are classified into one of three categories: financial

assets measured at fair value through profit or loss, financial assets that are debt instruments measured at amortised cost, and financial assets that are equity instruments measured at cost less impairment.

#### **(e) Financial Assets (cont'd)**

Financial assets are classified as at fair value through profit or loss when the financial assets are within the scope of Section 12 of the MPERS or if the financial assets are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort.

Changes in fair value are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure.

If a reliable measure of fair value is no longer available for an equity instrument that is not publicly traded but is measured at fair value through profit or loss, its fair value at the last date that instrument was reliably measurable is treated as the cost of the instrument, and it is measured at this cost amount less impairment until a reliable measure of fair value becomes available.

Changes in fair value are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure.

#### **Amortised Cost**

After initial recognition, debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are classified as current assets are measured at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

Effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of financial assets and of allocating the interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimate future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial assets or, when appropriate, a shorter period, to the carrying amount of the financial assets.

#### **Cost Less Impairment**

Equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair value cannot otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort, and contracts linked to such instruments that, if exercised, will result in delivery of such instruments, are measured at cost less impairment.

At the end of each reporting period, the Chamber assesses whether there is any objective evidence that financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost, are impaired.

Objective evidence could include:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer; or
- a breach of contract; or
- the lender granting to the borrower a concession that the lender would not otherwise consider; or
- it becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or
- observable data indicating that there is a measurable decrease in the estimated future cash flows from the financial assets since the initial recognition of those assets.

For certain category of financial assets, such as trade receivables, if it is determined that no objective evidence of impairment exists for an individually assessed financial asset, whether significant or not, the assets are included in a group with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assessed for impairment.

Impairment losses, in respect of financial assets measured at amortised cost, are measured as the differences between the assets' carrying amounts and the present values of their estimated cash flows discounted at the assets' original effective interest rate.

If there is objective evidence that impairment losses have been incurred on financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the amount of impairment losses are measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the best estimate of the amount that the Chamber would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial assets expire, or are settled, or the Chamber transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial assets.

On derecognition of financial assets in their entirety, the differences between the carrying amounts and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gains or losses are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure in the period of the transfer.

##### (f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the statement of cash flows comprise cash and bank balances, short-term bank deposits and other short-term, highly liquid investments that have a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

##### (g) Provisions

A provision is recognised when the Chamber has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The risks and uncertainties are taken into account in reaching the best estimate of a provision. When the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount recognised in respect of the provision is the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation.

##### (h) Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when the Chamber becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, financial liabilities are measured at transaction price, include transaction costs for financial liabilities not measured at fair value through profit or loss, unless the arrangement constitutes, in effect, a financing transaction for the Chamber to the arrangement.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Any difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liabilities derecognised and the consideration paid is recognised in the statement of income and expenditure.

##### (i) Revenue Recognition

###### i) Members' subscription and other income

Members' subscription is recognised as it accrues, when the right to receive is established.

###### ii) Rental income

Rental income are recognised on an accrual basis in accordance with the substances of the relevant agreement when it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transactions will flow to the Chamber and the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably.

###### iii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method, and accrued on a time basis.

###### iv) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the shareholder's rights to receive payment is established.

###### v) Other income

Other income is recognised on receipt basis.

##### (j) Employment Benefits

###### i) Short-Term Employment Benefits

Short-term employment benefits, such as wages, salaries and other benefits, are recognised at the undiscounted amount as a liability and an expense when the employees have rendered services to the Chamber.

The expected cost of accumulating compensated absences are measured at the undiscounted additional amount expected to be paid as a result of the unused entitlement that has accumulated at the end of the reporting period.

###### ii) Defined Contribution Plan

Contributions payable to the defined contribution plan are recognised as a liability and an expense when the employees have rendered services to the Chamber.

##### (k) Income Tax

Tax expense is recognised in the statement of income and expenditure, except that a change attributable to an item of income or expense recognised as other comprehensive income is also recognised in other comprehensive income.

Tax payable on taxable profit for current and past periods is recognised as a current tax liability to the extent unpaid. If the amount paid in respect of the current and past periods exceeds the amount payable for those periods, the excess is recognised as a current tax asset.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amounts expected to be paid or recovered, using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax liabilities and assets are offset if, and only if the Chamber has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and plan either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Deferred tax is provided in full on temporary differences which are the differences between the carrying amounts in the financial statements and the corresponding tax base of an asset or liability at the end of the reporting period. Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences that are expected to increase taxable profit in the future. Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences that are expected to reduce taxable profit in the future and the carry.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets are not recognised in respect of the temporary differences associated with the initial recognition of an asset or a liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and at the time of the transactions, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are also not recognised for temporary difference associated with the initial recognition of goodwill.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets reflect the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Chamber expects to recover or settle the carrying amounts of their assets and liabilities and are measured at the tax rates and laws that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

#### 3.1 JUDGEMENT AND ASSUMPTIONS APPLIED

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated by the Management Council and management and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believe to be reasonable under the circumstances. In the selection of accounting policies for the Chamber, the areas that require significant judgements and assumptions are as follows:-

##### i) Depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line method or another systematic method that reflects the consumption of the economic benefits of the asset over its useful life. Estimates are applied in the selection of the depreciation method, the useful lives and the residual values. The actual consumption of the economic benefits of the property, plant and equipment may differ from the estimates applied and this may lead to a gain or loss on an eventual disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment.

There are certain transactions and computations for which the ultimate tax determination may be different from the initial estimate. The Chamber recognises tax liabilities based on its understanding of the prevailing tax laws and estimates of whether such taxes will be due in the ordinary course of business. Where the final outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recognised, such difference will impact the income tax and deferred tax provisions in the year in which such determination is made.
